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The record will reflect that no conflicts 1 2 have been identified, so we will proceed with Public 3 Staff, Communications, Item P1. Ms. Proffitt, you're 4 up. 5 MS. PROFFITT: Good morning. My name is 6 Karen Proffitt of the Public Staff - Water, Sewer and 7 Telephone Division. Item P1 presents the filing --8 excuse me, presents the filing of the Joint 9 Application of Charter Fiberlink NC-CCO, LLC, and Time 10 Warner Cable Information Services North Carolina, LLC. 11 Each are seeking designation as an Eligible 12 Telecommunications Carrier for the purpose of 13 receiving federal Universal Service Fund support to 14 provide voice and broadband services in certain areas 15 defined by the census blocks that lack these services 16 and offers discounts to qualifying low-income 17 consumers through the Federal Communications 18 Commission's Lifeline Program. 19 These Companies seek ETC designation for 20 census blocks as specified in Exhibit A for Charter 21 Fiberlink and Exhibit B for Time Warner Cable 22 Information Services North Carolina. 23 The Public Staff reviewed the Joint 24 Application and additional filings, and we believe

1 that the Charter Entities satisfy the requirements for 2 designation as an ETC. The Public Staff recommends that the 3 4 Commission issue an Order finding that the Charter 5 Entities, which is Charter Fiberlink and Time Warner 6 Cable Information Services North Carolina, have met 7 the requirements to serve as an ETC in the requested 8 census blocks and designating each as an ETC as 9 requested. 10 A copy of the proposed order is attached as 11 Exhibit Number P-1. 12 COMMISSIONER BROWN-BLAND: Move approval of 13 the recommendation. 14 COMMISSIONER GRAY: Second. 15 CHAIR MITCHELL: It's been moved and 16 seconded that the item be approved as recommended by 17 the Public Staff. 1	On April 2, 2021, Pluris Hampstead filed the
2	North Carolina Non-Warranty Deed for its sewage pump
3	station lot serving Wylie Branch completing the
4	Application.
5	The Public Staff recommends that the

7	franchise and approving Pluris Hampstead's proposed
8	rates.

The Public Staff recommends that the 1 2 Commission issue the Public Staff's proposed order 3 granting franchise and approving Pluris Hampstead's 4 proposed rates and correcting that error I pointed out 5 earlier in the proposed order. 6 CHAIR MITCHELL: I'll take a motion. 7 COMMISSIONER GRAY: Move approval. 8 (WHEREUPON, the Court Reporter 9 requested Ms. Casselberry to 10 repeat her last sentence due to 11 audio feedback.) 12 CHAIR MITCHELL: Ms. Casselberry, if you 13 could repeat your last --14 MS. CASSELBERRY: The Public Staff 15 recommends that the Commission issue the proposed 16 order granting the franchise and approving Pluris 17 Hampstead's proposed rates, including replacing 18 "agreement" with "sewer service permit" in the order. 19 COMMISSIONER BROWN-BLAND: I'll second. 5	MS. CASSELBERRY: Item P3 is Docket Number
6	W-1305, Sub 19. On February 4, 2020, Pluris Hampstead
7	filed an Application for a Certificate of Public
8	Convenience and Necessity to provide sewer utility
9	service at 15441 Bailey Shoppes, 15489 Vintage
10	Associates, 15395 Hampstead GoGas, and 15531 Hampstead
11	United Methodist Church, U.S. Highway 17, Hampstead,
12	in Pender County, North Carolina, and for approval of
13	rates.
14	On October 29th, 2020, Pluris Hampstead
15	filed an Agreement and Conveying Lift Station and
16	Granting Easements with Bailey, dated May 21st, 2020,
17	and on our March 31st, 2021, an Agreement to Convey
18	Lift Station and Facilities and Grant Easements with
19	Vintage dated July 1st, 2020, completing its
20	Application.
21	The Public Staff recommends that the
22	Commission issue the proposed order granting the
23	franchise and approving Pluris Hampstead's proposed

24 rates.

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1 COMMISSIONER BROWN-BLAND: Move approval of 2 the recommendation. COMMISSIONER GRAY: Second. 3 4 CHAIR MITCHELL: It's been moved and 5 seconded that the item be approved as recommended by 6 the Public Staff. Any questions or discussion on the 7 motion? 8 (No response) 9 Hearing none, I'll call the roll for a vote. 10 Indicate your support for the motion with an aye and 11 your opposition with a no. Commissioner Brown-Bland. 12 COMMISSIONER BROWN-BLAND: Aye. 13 CHAIR MITCHELL: Commissioner Clodfelter. 14 COMMISSIONER CLODFELTER: Aye. 15 CHAIR MITCHELL: Commissioner Gray. I'm 16 sorry. 17 COMMISSIONER GRAY: Thank you. Aye. 18 CHAIR MITCHELL: Commissioner Clodfelter. 19 COMMISSIONER CLODFELTER: Aye. Aye 20 (technology repeat). And that's not two votes, it's 21 just one vote repeated. 22 CHAIR MITCHELL: Got it. All right. 23 Commissioner Duffley. 24 COMMISSIONER DUFFLEY: Aye.

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1	CHAIR MITCHELL: Commissioner Hughes.
2	COMMISSIONER HUGHES: Aye.
3	CHAIR MITCHELL: And Commissioner McKissick.
4	COMMISSIONER MCKISSICK: Aye, aye. I'll
5	take two votes.
6	(Laughing)
7	CHAIR MITCHELL: Oh, Commissioner McKissick.
8	All right. And for the record I support the motion as
9	well and the motion carries.
10	(MOTION PASSES)
11	CHAIR MITCHELL: Thank you, Ms. Casselberry.
12	You had the heavy lift this morning.
13	We will proceed now to Public Staff,
14	Supplemental, Water Item P1. Mr. Grantmyre, you're
15	up.
16	MR. GRANTMYRE: Good morning. Bill
17	Grantmyre, Public Staff, Legal. This is Supplemental
18	P1, Water, Docket Number W-1148, Sub 20. It's
19	Mountain Air Utilities Corporation, Petition for
20	Appointment of Emergency Operator.
21	On April 29, 2021, the Public Staff filed a
22	Petition to appoint Carolina Water emergency operator
23	for the Mountain Air water and wastewater utility
24	systems at Mountain Air in Yancey County. This is

1	near Burnsville and it has approximately 480
2	customers.
3	The Mountain Air system is mainly at the top
4	of the mountain. There's a lot of systems in the
5	mountains but this one is at the top of the mountain,
6	or most of it.
7	This was a franchise utility to the
8	developer. Mountain Air Utility Corporation is an
9	affiliate of the developer. And on April 5, 2021, the
10	Utility emailed to the Commission a request for an
11	emergency operator to be appointed.
12	In my 44 years doing water and wastewater
13	before the Commission, almost all of the
14	Commission-appointed emergency operators have been
15	developer-owned utilities. As you can tell, I'm
16	deviating a little bit from my agenda item.
17	Going forward, I suggest that the Commission
18	consider much higher bonds if it's going to be a
19	developer-owned utility. I would suggest a minimum
20	bond for developer-owned utilities of at least
21	\$100,000. The current minimum is \$10,000, but that
22	was established in the 1980's.
23	Mountain Air Utility does have a \$30,000
24	bond which was posted in 2001. The emergency upgrades

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required of the emergency operator will materially
 exceed the \$30,000.

3 Last week, First Citizens Bank who has the 4 letter of credit filed a 60-day notice of cancelation. 5 G.S. § 62-110.3(d) states that the appointment of an 6 emergency operator forfeits the bond. It also has 7 required wording in that same subsection that the 8 Commission must decide the amount of the bond to be 9 forfeited. And I have drafted supplemental language 10 and submitted it to the Commission Staff adding a finding of fact and an ordering paragraph that the 11 12 amount necessary to cure the emergency will materially 13 exceed the \$30,000.

14 The Mountain Air POA filed a letter with the 15 Commission on April 26th requesting an emergency 16 operator be appointed. Carolina Water has agreed to 17 be appointed emergency operator and Carolina has more 18 than 40-years' experience operating water and 19 wastewater systems in the North Carolina mountains. 20 They have twenty-three different service areas in the 21 North Carolina mountains ranging all the way from Ashe 22 County in the northwest to far western's Cherokee 23 County in the southwest.

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Carolina Water currently is the emergency

operator for three systems up in Ashe County and for 1 2 24 years has been the emergency operator of a system in Durham County. Carolina Water was also recently 3 4 the emergency operator in Macon County for Riverbend 5 Utilities. And if y'all can remember the famous power 6 outage at the Franklin Courthouse. Carolina Water 7 will advance significant funds as necessary to make 8 the emergency upgrades which are desperately needed.

9 The Public Staff, as was approved in the 10 Webb Creek emergency operator several years ago, is 11 recommending hybrid terms -- returns for Carolina 12 Water. As you remember, Pluris Webb Creek had to 13 replace the dilapidated wastewater treatment plant, 14 but they also had to make material upgrades, temporary 15 upgrades. The hybrid approach has a return on rate 16 base for whatever they invest in the system, and it 17 also has an operating margin on the operating expenses. 18

19The Public Staff believes that Carolina20Water is well qualified to be the emergency operator21and recommends that the Commission issue the Public22Staff's approved recommended order and call in the23\$30,000 bond letter of credit. Thank you.24CHAIR MITCHELL: Thank you, Mr. Grantmyre.

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Several questions for you.

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2 First, I want to express my appreciation to 3 the Public Staff and to Carolina Water for working 4 together to get things in order out there. Thank you. 5 I know it's been a fire drill and I know you all are already, both the Company and the Public Staff, are 6 7 already stretched thin to cover workloads, so thank 8 I also thank you, Mr. Grantmyre, for your you. 9 suggestion that the Commission consider bond amounts. 10 We will take you up on that suggestion at some point 11 in time in the near future. 12 Just out of curiosity, Mr. Grantmyre, with 13 respect to cost recovery, I understand the 14 recommendations of the Public Staff regarding the 15 returns on investment that Carolina Water is going to 16 be required to make, but in instances like this where 17 this, you know, pending before the Commission is the 18 transfer application to the Redbird Entity, not to 19 Carolina Water, at what point in time and how will 20 Carolina Water seek cost recovery for the investment 21 that it's having to make here? 22 MR. GRANTMYRE: Well, in emergency operator 23 appointments the emergency operator is always made 24 whole. And if the Commission were to approve a

would recommend in the Commission Order that the other entity reimburse Carolina Water for its full investment, and they would add that to the rate base. CHAIR MITCHELL: Okay. MR. GRANTMYRE: Or the Commission could assess the customers for the emergency operator. But emergency operators, it's always required that they be made whole. And being an emergency operator is not fun and it's really hard to get them, so we always want to make sure they're made whole. CHAIR MITCHELL: Understood. Understood. Thank you for that. Additional questions for the Public Staff on this matter? COMMISSIONER BROWN-BLAND: Yes, Madam Chair. CHAIR MITCHELL: Commissioner Brown-Bland. COMMISSIONER BROWN-BLAND: Mr. Grantmyre, I just wonder if you could -- well first, are the customers actually feeling or experiencing or otherwise aware of the impacts of the situation now? MR. GRANTMYRE: They are very much aware. There have been a number of water outages and a number

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of sewer leaks or sanitary sewer overflows.

customers really want an emergency operator. And I 1 2 think the customers are going to be intervening in the 3 transfer case very shortly. 4 COMMISSIONER BROWN-BLAND: I was just 5 wondering if this was visible to them, but it sounds 6 like it very definitely is. 7 MR. GRANTMYRE: Yes. If I could add 8 something? The way we've structured the customer 9 notice, it's a short customer notice, and the 10 developers work with the POA that they will distribute 11 it by email to all of the POA members. So, the day or 12 day after the order is issued they would have notice. 13 And we're, also, in the notice giving them 14 instructions how to get to the full Commission Order 15 so they could read that. 16 COMMISSIONER BROWN-BLAND: Thank you, 17 Mr. Grantmyre. I move approval of the Public Staff's 18 recommendation including that we call in the bond. 19 COMMISSIONER GRAY: Second. 20 CHAIR MITCHELL: It's been moved and 21 seconded that the recommendation of the Public Staff 22 be approved. Questions or discussion on this motion? 23 Commissioner Hughes, I saw that your hand 24 was up.

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1	COMMISSIONER HUGHES: Chair Mitchell, I had	
2	my hand up.	
3	CHAIR MITCHELL: You may proceed.	
4	COMMISSIONER HUGHES: Thank you.	
5	Mr. Grantmyre, a few questions. The \$15 million in	
6	liens, can you give us a little bit more information	
7	about those? Are they for debts that were incurred in	
8	building the original system? Are they for something	
9	completely different that the if a water system was	
10	used as collateral material? And what's the status of	
11	those liens? Who owns those liens?	
12	MR. GRANTMYRE: We have data requests out to	
13	get that information. We the liens this is a	
14	development and it's a beautiful development, but it	
15	failed after the recession in 2008, and a number of	
16	deeds of trust on the development were foreclosed.	
17	And there might be some judgment liens, also. These	
18	are not really liens of the utility, but as it happens	
19	in many, many developer-owned systems the developer	
20	intermingles the utility property with the real estate	
21	property and, quite frankly, they're very sloppy about	
22	ever transferring the property to the utility. And so	
23	that's going to all have to be worked out and it's	
24	going to take a significant amount of time.	
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1	To my knowledge, the utility assets as
2	utility assets were not really encumbered, but it's
3	really they're in names other than the utility that
4	are encumbered. So, what we have is a real mess.
5	COMMISSIONER HUGHES: I like that technical
6	term. I've just got a couple of other questions. You
7	had mentioned that one option for the cost recovery
8	was to quote "assess the customers". How exactly
9	would be that proceed? And I apologize if I should
10	know this, what is the authority for us to assess an
11	individual customer or would we grant would we
12	grant the future utility the ability to do that?
13	MR. GRANTMYRE: I'd have to find that. I
14	know it's happened a number of times before. I think,
15	in emergency operators the Commission has the power to
16	issue assessments and it's different than if it's just
17	a utility. Carolina Water could have requested a rate
18	increase which would have provided more funds but,
19	since they will be made whole, they did not want to
20	burden the customers at this time. But I'd have to
21	get the exact authority. But I know it's been done a
22	number of times in the past.
23	Christmount was not emergency operator, but
24	we assessed the customers there a couple of years ago

for the system upgrades. And I know we assessed customers down, years ago, down on the coast where Evirocon's wastewater plant collapsed, and we assessed the customers there for the renovation to the plant.

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5 COMMISSIONER HUGHES: Well, if you could 6 provide some information we can work with our staff, 7 too, to just get a little bit more on the history of 8 how that would work. And I'm assuming some of these 9 customers are -- I mean, most of the customers are 10 residential but some of the customers are, I assume, 11 the clubhouse and the commercial, you know, the 12 commercial components of this development. So, it 13 would be interesting to see what our powers were to 14 assess some of those, you know, potentially high 15 valued customers that would be able to pay 16 assessments. I'd be interested in that.

17 MR. GRANTMYRE: This is a very high-end 18 community. It has an airplane landing strip on the 19 top of the mountain which is paved. So, the customers 20 will not feel any pain in paying an assessment. It's 21 only about 60 full-time residents on the mountain and 22 there are 400 and some odd residences. So, the season 23 will get very busy in a hurry in the next couple of 24 weeks.

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Carolina Water has agreed to become emergency operator effective next Monday, May 10th. They've needed a substantial amount of time to prepare so they could hit the ground running. COMMISSIONER HUGHES: Okay. Well, last question and I'll leave it to my colleagues who probably have more questions. Has the County in your discussions, negotiations, whatever you want to call them, has the County had a seat at the table? I understand this is -- I believe a planned unit development that the County recruited, approved. I'm just curious if they have any involvement at all. MR. GRANTMYRE: The County has not had any involvement to date, and I doubt the County would have any interest. The wastewater is treated bulk wastewater treatment by the Town of Burnsville. And, quite frankly, with only 60 permanent residents on the mountain, the voters up there have little to say as to what goes on in the County. COMMISSIONER HUGHES: That's all for now. Thank you very much. And I echo my colleagues' thanks

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for what I assume the technical term is "mess" of you all dealing with this.

24 CHAIR MITCHELL: Any additional questions or NORTH CAROLINA UTILITIES COMMISSION

discussion on the motion? Commissioner McKissick. 1 2 COMMISSIONER McKISSICK: Thank you, Madam 3 Chair. 4 Mr. Grantmyre, just a few questions. Ι 5 gather Redbird is not currently a regulated entity in 6 North Carolina. Do we have any idea what kind of 7 timeframe would be required for them to become a 8 regulated entity in our state to qualify as such? 9 MR. GRANTMYRE: They have filed nine 10 transfer -- eight transfer applications and one Application for a Certificate of Public Convenience. 11 That's down on Pine Knoll Shores. We had sent them 12 13 letters as to deficiencies in their contracts -- in 14 their applications, and for the first two they have, 15 in April, I think it was April 15th, they finalized 16 those contracts. I don't know how long it would take 17 to finalize the others. I don't know how long it would take to finalize this case that is Mountain Air, 18 19 because I understand there is going to be intervenors 20 in the case, and Ed Finley is the intervenor's lawyer 21 and so. 22 COMMISSIONER MCKISSICK: Okay. Do we know 23 if Redbird has experience in other jurisdictions? 24 MR. GRANTMYRE: They have --

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COMMISSIONER McKISSICK: What type -- I don't even know how large of a company this is or how experienced they are, whether they're -- you know, maybe you can give me some idea.

5 MR. GRANTMYRE: They have systems in 6 Missouri, I believe Kentucky, I think Arkansas, and 7 Louisiana, and possibly Tennessee. They're fairly new 8 in acquiring systems. They've been doing it the last 9 three or four years. So, we don't know too much about 10 them and that will be part of the due diligence that 11 we'll have during the discovery process. We're 12 just -- within the last week we started sending out data requests for the two applications that they've 13 14 completed.

15 COMMISSIONER McKISSICK: Got it. And I 16 understand from reading the materials that basically 17 the appointment of Carolina Water Service today 18 continues, and they will function in that capacity 19 until some future point and time, but at any point 20 they could theoretically decide they wanted to 21 withdraw; is that correct, the way it works? 22 MR. GRANTMYRE: That is correct, but they 23 have been continued -- Carolina Water has always 24 upheld its obligations as emergency operator until

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there was a permitted solution in place. Like I said, 1 2 that one in Durham they've had for 24 years. It's the 3 Hardscrabble system over there in Durham, the sewer 4 system. And they've been doing the three water 5 systems in Ashe County about five years. So, they 6 have the ability to resign, but in my discussions with 7 Carolina Water President, Mr. Denton, they fully 8 intend to be the emergency operator until the 9 Commission approves the transfer to somebody. 10 COMMISSIONER McKISSICK: Well, I think that

11 probably answered my next question. If there was any 12 timeframe during -- you know, for the appointment of 13 emergency operator. I gather it can -- it's basically 14 indefinite then until somebody else comes along.

MR. GRANTMYRE: Yes. I got an emergency operator back in the 1980's and it's still an emergency operator; small little system near Garner, North Carolina. So, sometimes you've got it forever which is why it's important that the emergency operator gets some compensation.

21 COMMISSIONER McKISSICK: Sure. I agree.
22 Thank you, Mr. Grantmyre. I don't have any further
23 questions.

24 CHAIR MITCHELL: With that, unless there are NORTH CAROLINA UTILITIES COMMISSION any additional questions for the Public Staff, I'll go
 ahead and call the roll for a vote.

3 COMMISSIONER HUGHES: Chair Mitchell, just a 4 really quick question, follow-up question, please. 5 CHAIR MITCHELL: All right. Please proceed. COMMISSIONER HUGHES: Just about the 6 7 emergency operators. Is it possible for an emergency 8 operator to participate in a purchase of the system 9 that they're operating? Is there any preclusion for 10 that?

11 They are not precluded and MR. GRANTMYRE: 12 so they could get involved, but I don't think Carolina 13 Water intends to. The current proceeding with Redbird would need to be decided either for or against the 14 15 transfer. And, if it was decided against the transfer 16 to Redbird, the Public Staff would encourage Carolina 17 Water to acquire the system. And I used the word 18 "encourage". There is no commitment to acquire it. 19 COMMISSIONER HUGHES: Thank you. That's 20 what I was looking for. 21 No further questions, Chair. 22 CHAIR MITCHELL: With that, I will go ahead 23 and call the roll for a vote. Indicate your support

for the motion with an aye and your opposition with a

17	Moving on, the Commission has before it for
18	approval its minutes from Staff Conference of April
19	26th, 2021. I'll take a motion, please.
20	COMMISSIONER BROWN-BLAND: Move approval of
21	the minutes.
22	COMMISSIONER GRAY: And a second.
23	CHAIR MITCHELL: It's been moved and
24	seconded that our minutes be approved. Any questions,

discussion on that motion? 1 2 (No response) 3 All in favor of approving our minutes 4 indicate with an aye. 5 (All Commissioners say aye). CHAIR MITCHELL: Any opposed? 6 7 (No response) 8 Our minutes of April 26th are approved. 9 Turning next to additional business, I see 10 that Sam has come on screen so, Sam, I will turn it over to you for introduction of our newest addition to 11 12 the Commission staff. 13 MR. WATSON: Thank you very much. Good 14 morning, Commissioners. It's my pleasure to introduce 15 Erin Duffy this morning. She actually served as a 16 staff attorney some years ago and we are very excited 17 to have her return to us. She's also a law school 18 graduate of Vanderbilt, so we don't even need to get 19 into ACC disputes with her. But she has regulatory 20 experience before she came on with us in D.C. with the old ICC and with the FCC. So, we are extremely 21 22 pleased to have her join us. 23 Erin, if you can unmute yourself and say hi, 24 then folks will get a chance to see your face and

11	welcome, Erin. We are delighted that you're here with
12	us. You already clearly can function well on this
13	videoconference technology. You can mute and unmute
14	so you are way ahead of the game there so no doubt
15	that you are going to be an excellent addition to the
16	team who can jump right in. And I'll withhold all
17	comments about Vanderbilt at least for the time being.
18	COMMISSIONER BROWN-BLAND: Commodores.
19	(Laughter)
20	CHAIR MITCHELL: With that, any additional
21	business for the Commission this morning before we
22	adjourn?
