



I am a customer of Duke Energy here in Wilmington NC.

I was one of the first in my area to have solar panels installed on my house in an effort to have an energy efficient home and help the environment. At the time, it was not an inexpensive project, but I feel it was worth it. Duke Energy's program now does not pay for overproduction, but they do sell what solar users put on the grid with no compensation to the solar owners. I was on the time of use program until this month. Duke changed the program to only give me credit for energy I produced only during discount times of the day. That left me with a growing bank of kilowatt credits I would have to use or on May 31th that bank would be wiped out at no cost to Duke.

Now I understand that Duke is proposing building more gas-powered plants and nuclear facilities instead of building more solar and wind farms. If the compensation was on a level fair playing field, Duke could see more people installing solar to help offset some of that required production.

I asked my solar contractor to look at updating my system to the newer more efficient panels (Mine is about 8 years old) to help up my production, but I was told that changes to the Duke's solar programs made that not worth the money.

I have heard the excuses that people on solar do not pay their fair share to the up keep of the power infrastructure, but even us on solar pay a fee to be a Duke Energy Customer, even if we produce enough to offset our power usage.

I would propose that Duke Energy reimburse solar system owners at the full rate that they sell power produced by these systems. The still will be charging us for the connection to the energy grid, and we can help offset some of their energy needs by updating our systems and producing more energy for them to sell.

Another option would be to bring in another electric energy reseller to compete with Duke and break the energy monopoly duke has in this area. Competition is always good. Look at the cost of Internet service in my area since AT&T came in to compete with Spectrum. My monthly service was cut by a third with better speed and service, and I understand that two more internet service providers will be coming to my area soon.


I have seen the ads on TV saying that last year Duke made \$4 billion dollars and the CEO made \$20 million.

It is time we reigned Duke Energy inn and brought all this under control, of start the process to bring in some competition.



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
