Hope Mills police searching for missing woman

A search is underway in Hope Mills for Rebecca Michelle Garcia-James, who police believe may be in danger, according to the Hope Mills Police Department.

Garcia-James also goes by the name Rebecca Fellows, according to police.

Garcia-James was last seen about midnight July 8 in the 3700 block of Legion Road in Hope Mills. She was wearing a black tank top, ripped and faded blue jean shorts and pink slippers. She was seen being picked up in a dark gray 2018 Dodge Challenger, according to a news release.

Garcia-James, 40, is 5 feet 4 inches tall, weighs 150 pounds and has brown hair and brown eyes. She has tattoos of "Jerrica Hayley" on her chest, "Olivia" on the left side of her neck and "Serenity" on the right side of her neck, according to the release.

Capt. Mark Phillips with the Police Department said

Garcia-James has not been seen or heard from since July 8. She has not been on social media and is believed to be in danger.

Fayetteville police have made an arrest in the shooting death of Raymond Napper II, 21, of the 2000 block of Foster Gwin Lane, according to a news release.

Damarus Jerome Ray, 20, of the 1600 block of Hazelhurst Drive, was charged with second-degree murder.

The shooting death was reported July 16 in the parking lot in the 700 block of South Reilly Road. Officers said Napper was driven by private

vehicle to Cape Fear Valley Medical Center, where he was pronounced dead, according to the release.

Ray was arrested Sunday and held at the Cumberland County Detention Center with bail set at \$500,000, according to the statement.

Russell has been charged with

first-degree murder, robbery with a dangerous weapon and assault with a deadly weapon.

The proposed JAAR per kWh for other non-demand rate class customers, including regulatory fee, is: 0.361 cents for Small General Service; 0.269 cents for Medium General Service; 0.066 cents for Seasonal and Intermittent Service; 0.194 cents for Traffic Signal Service; and no charge for Outdoor Lighting Service. The proposed JAAR per kilowatt for demand rate class customers, including regulatory fee, is: \$1.06 for Medium General Service and \$1.56 for Large General Service. The JAAR for all customer classes would be effective for service rendered on and after December 1, 2020, through November 30, 2021.

the way the vote had come about. Henderson did not comment.

The vote came after West offered up the option of meeting later this week to hear from the county health director, a pediatrician on health concerns and from County Manager Craig Honeycutt on the county's broadband plans.

That meeting was to have been followed up by a July 29 session to make a decision.

Strickland agreed to the informational meeting, but asked that the vote be taken this week, as well, since she would be unable to attend next week's meeting.

"In all reality, I'd be happy to vote right now on the plan I would like to see us move forward," she said. "But if you want to wait on more data, that's fine. I just won't be here for that vote."

Strickland said she had come to the meeting with her mind made up on which option she preferred — Plan B, the plan that Gov. Roy Cooper announced last week that North Carolina schools are allowed to open under.

"This is very important to me," she said. "We all have been working very hard and it gives us more time to plan on the backside if we make the decision this week."

West continued his effort to schedule the meetings, suggesting Friday at 11 a.m. that could include a vote provided the presentations could be made on such short notice.

"If that is the plan,

Mr. Chairman there is no point in having the meeting Friday because I can't be here to vote Wednesday," Strickland said. "That was the whole reason I was asking to move it up to Friday so that I could have a voice. But if I am not going to be able to have a voice, you might as well stick with next week."

"But I can tell you my vote is for Plan B as a directive to central office to make Plan B happen. If you come back and say we need a month delay for buses, I will grant it. But just so everybody is clear my vote is for Plan B and get these students in the building as soon as possible. I don't think we need to have all of these presentations."

The board needs to give central office staff a directive so that the staff knows what to do next, she said.

West said that was up to what the board wanted.

Henderson said he understood Strickland's concerns, but that he likes to have a lot of data before making a decision.

Democko said he agreed with Strickland and Leatham said the board could "information itself to death," and would simply be kicking the can farther down the road.

That would make it more and more difficult for families, teachers and students to plan, he said.

"We are not going to make everybody happy," Leatham said.

Strickland said that is why she thought the board needed to act and not wait. The board could then have

those presentations to be told how the reopening could be done in the safest way.

"Right now we are sitting here and everybody in the county is in limbo — 'which way are they going to go?' " she said. "Because right now I am the only one who has opened my mouth and said which way I am leaning. Actually not leaning, which way I am going to do — this is the way I am going to vote."

Voting allows families and educators to decide what is right for them, Plan B or the virtual academy, she said.

West said he didn't come to vote, but read a statement that he, too, would vote for Plan B. Democko said he supported Plan B as well.

"We need to get these kids back to school," Democko

said. "We need to get back to some normalcy the safest we can."

Strickland made the motion after West said he was prepared vote. It was seconded by Democko.

DRAFT PLAN B

The draft of Plan B currently calls for splitting students in kindergarten through eighth grade into two groups. Each group will attend school for face-to-face instruction two straight days a week, then do remote learning the other three days.

Remote learning for some days will be mandatory.

Children of teachers and other school staff who are working are allowed to go to school four days a week, as are high-risk students who need extra support, if it's appropriate for them.

The draft Plan B

currently calls for Wednesday of each week to be a day for deep cleaning at the schools and giving teachers time to prepare both in-school and remote learning instruction.

WCPS has not made a decision yet on what the length of the school day will be this year.

High school will be a bit different than elementary and middle school.

Right now, students will go to the building four days a week and do remote learning the fifth day. High school principals felt that students would get more out of it if they went four days straight, instead of having remote learning during the middle of the week.

So high school students will be divided into three groups, and each will have

one week of four days of in-school instruction and then a day of remote learning. Then the next two weeks will be entirely remote learning. The rotation will start all over.

The Voluntary Virtual Learning Program form has a deadline of July 30 for parents to sign up their children, so the WCPS will know the number of students taking part in the program in order to figure out how many staff members are going to be needed.

Parents signing their children up for the program have to commit to the first semester. After the first semester, they can sign their children up for a second semester of total remote learning or send them to school.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the North Carolina Utilities Commission has scheduled a public hearing in the annual demand-side management (DSM) and energy efficiency (EE) cost recovery proceeding for Duke Energy Progress, LLC (DEP). The public hearing has been scheduled to begin immediately following the hearings in Docket Nos. E-2, Subs 1250 and 1251, which are scheduled to begin at 10:00 a.m. on Tuesday, September 15, 2020, in Commission Hearing Room 2115, Dobbs Building, 430 North Salisbury Street, Raleigh, North Carolina. This proceeding is being held pursuant to the provisions of N.C.G.S. § 62-133.9 and Commission Rule R8-69, for the purpose of determining whether an increment or decrement rider is required to allow DEP to recover all reasonable and prudent costs incurred for adoption and implementation of new DSM and new EE measures and appropriate incentives. Public witness testimony will be received in accordance with Commission Rule R1-21(g).

On June 9, 2020, Duke Energy Progress, LLC (DEP or Applicant), filed its application for approval of DSM/EE cost recovery pursuant to N.C.G.S. § 62-133.9 and Rule R8-69. By its application DEP requests a total annual revenue increase of approximately \$12.9 million, effective January 1, 2021, from the DSM/EE rider currently in effect. This request would result in an increase of 0.101 cents per kilowatt-hour (kWh) for residential customers. Non-residential General Service customers, depending upon their participation in DEP's DSM or EE programs, would see a DSM rider increase of 0.006 cents per kWh, and an EE rider decrease of 0.042 cents per kWh. Lighting customers would see an EE rider increase of 0.037 cents per kWh. Industrial and large commercial customers that have, under N.C.G.S. § 62-133.9, opted out of and never participated in DEP's DSM and EE programs are not subject to the rider.

Further information may be obtained from the Office of the Chief Clerk, North Carolina Utilities Commission, 430 North Salisbury Street, Raleigh, North Carolina, where a copy of DEP's application is available for review by the public.
