

Please intervene on behalf of the Sherwood Forest Subdivision in Transylvania County, NC in the matter of the proposed rate increase filed by A & D Water Service, Inc (docket no. W-354, sub 356). No changes have been made to our infrastructure as far as I know in many years, so the justification for this increase is unclear. In addition, the proposed rates seem unfair. It might interest you to know that only 4 of the 22 Condominium units listed (Sheffield Place Condominium Association, a part of Sherwood Forest) are occupied full-time—a total of only five individuals live there year-round. Although our population goes up slightly in the summer, most of our units remain empty. Yet the Assisted Living Facility pays less than half of what we do, for a larger population. It seems that A & D collects a lot of money from us (and wants more), but is providing very little actual service. In short, they are receiving quite a bit of money for nothing. The restaurant listed in the proposed rate increase also stands empty, so cannot be producing much sewerage at this time. The Condominiums are also responsible for maintaining our our septic tanks, including pumping them out. A & D Water mainly runs our nearby drain field. Again, this is a lot of money for little service.

It is also a matter or hardship. Within the last year, rates hikes have been approved and been effected for Sherwood Forest residents for both our water service (separate from sewer) and our electricity rates. This 27% increase in sewer rates comes at an inopportune time for our mostly retired and elderly population.

Please do what you can for the consumers and residents of Sherwood Forest, NC. We appreciate any help you can give us. Thank you for your time.

Good afternoon, I am writing as a resident of Carolina Trace Gated Communities in Sanford NC, in regards to the proposed increase of my Base Water and Sewage cost. If this proposal continues to go forward, base charges we will pay without using one gallon of water (!!!) will increase from almost \$50 to over \$75. To pay \$75 without a single drop of water leaving my faucet is absolutely absurd. I work at Fort Bragg, and am currently in training to become a Psychological Operations Captain (37A). Many of my fellow residents here in Carolina Trace (and in areas serviced by UI Water) are also Soldiers or Airmen. Operating out of the home of US Army Special Operations and Airborne forces often forces us to be away from home and family for extended periods of time. For many Junior Servicemembers (the men and women I lead and command), small increases like these can slowly tear the fabric of their strongest resource - the family apart. I have seen time and time again, how small expenses reak havoc on junior military families. Having been recently promoted and living near many retirees. I can see how these same changes can bring unneeded stress upon those that have served our country for years and no longer work. I have already emailed Ms. Gina Casselberry, Raleigh's Public Staff Utilities Engineer, but am also reaching out to you for help and aid. Dear Mr. Stein,

My wife and I own a townhouse (72 Dogwood Knob #12A, Sapphire, NC 2874) located in the Hilltop Community in the Fairfield Sapphire Valley Service Area. We use this property as a second home, traveling between Charleston, SC and Sapphire, NC.

Utilities, Inc. has filed with the State of North Carolina Utilities Commission, proposing rate increases for water and sewer utility service. The increase would be substantial - almost 58% - in the Fairfield Sapphire Valley Service Area.

- The Base Facility Charge would increase from \$19.89 to \$26.95. This is payable every month even if we use no water.
- The Wastewater Sewer Operations would increase from \$35.52 to \$60.22. Again, this is payable every month even if you use no water.

So one's bill - without even using a drop of water - would go from \$55.41 to \$87.17; an increase of \$31.76.


Utilities, Inc. enjoys a monopoly right now. There are no other providers from which to choose and we can't drill a well on this property.

I request that this excessively large increase not be allowed to stand.



We, the undersigned, being all the officers and directors of this corporation consent and agree that the following corporate resolution was made on July 10, 2017, at a 7:00 p.m. meeting of the Woodhaven Property Owners Association, Flat Rock, North Carolina 28731.

In accordance with State law and the bylaws of this corporation, by unanimous consent, the Board of Directors adopt the following resolution.

Whereas, Woodhaven POA and Carolina Water Service (CWS) customers are outraged at the 20% water rate increase, and ,

Whereas, double digit water rate increase by (CWS)/Utilities, Inc. and historic double digit rate increases are symptomatic of a process that lacks clarity in justification, and,

Whereas, the complex laws, regulations, and processes of North Carolina Utilities Commission (NCUC) are not customer friendly and give an advantage to lawyer supported CWS/Útilities, Inc. in the rate justification process, and,

Whereas, historically, submitted signatures of residents, registering as high as 90% of Woodhaven POA members, do not appear in public record and seem to be ignored.

Therefore, be it resolved that the corporation shall:

- 1. Seek to contact other customers of CWS/Utilities, Inc. and build a coalition of concern.
- 2. Undertake a campaign to inform and persuade local, regional, and state government officials of the problems with the laws, regulations, and processes of private water rate increase issues.
- 3. Communicate a benchmark of public/private water rate increase comparisons as a ratio between states to keep NC's high ratio in line with the average ratio or even better.



Dear Mr. Drooz:

I am writing to register my dismay regarding the proposed water and sewer rate increase that CWS is requesting with the North Carolina Utilities Commission (NCUC). The proposed rate increase is in the 20% to 40% range. I feel this proposed increase is rather outrageous and far outside the norm for increases from any source for any service. I live on a fixed income relying on past retirement savings and social security. Recently it has been reported that our social security benefit may increase by 2.2% in 2018, which would hardly cover the proposed 20-40 percent increase cited above. Increases in rates should reflect the reality of what customers can afford to pay — which is in the 2% "neighborhood."

To reiterate, I do expect increases, from time to time, in charges for services be it water, sewer, electric, cable and so forth, I would appreciate it if you would do what you can to keep the increase that CWS proposes down to a reasonable amount consistent with reality that customers can afford to pay.
