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PROCEEDINGS

2.1

CHAIR MITCHELL: Good evening. I'm

Charlotte Mitchell, Chair of the North Carolina

Utilities Commission. With me tonight are

Commissioners ToNola D. Brown-Bland, Daniel G.

Clodfelter, Kimberly W. Duffley, Floyd B. McKissick,

Jr, and Jeffrey A. Hughes.

I now call hearing Docket No. E-2, Sub 1300, which is the Application of Duke Energy Progress or DEP for adjustment of rates and charges applicable to electric utility service in North Carolina.

As I'm required to do by the State

Government Ethics Act, I remind all Members of the

Commission of our duty to avoid conflicts of interest

and inquire, at this time, if any member of the

Commission has any known conflict with respect to

matters coming before us this evening.

(No response)

CHAIR MITCHELL: The record will reflect that no conflicts have been identified, so we will go ahead.

In late 2021, Legislation authorizing performance-based regulation of electric public utilities operating in North Carolina was enacted by

the General Assembly and signed into law by the Governor. This Legislation, which I will refer to as House Bill 951, established an alternative ratemaking approach that involves, among other things, a multi-year rate plan. Under this new ratemaking approach, the revenue requirement for each rate year of the multi-year rate plan will build on a general rate-based revenue requirement established using a historical test year with step-ups that reflect a projected revenue requirements associated with new investments to be put into service during the course of each year of the multi-year rate plan.

2.1

The Legislation limits a multi-year rate plan to three years and establishes that base rates cannot change past a certain percentage in rate years 2 and 3 once they are approved by the Commission.

On October 6th, 2022, DEP filed its application to adjust retail-based rates, as well as a request for an accounting order, along with the direct testimony and exhibits of 22 witnesses, supporting its application.

By its application, DEP seeks approval from the Commission in accordance with House Bill 951, to implement, for the first time, performance-based

regulation and a three-year rate plan. DEP's application proposes rate increases over each of the three years of its proposed plan for a total increase in base rate revenues of approximately 18 percent.

Broken down by year, DEP requests an increase of 6.6 percent to general base rate revenues plus an additional 3.1 percent in rate year 1, 4.3 percent in rate year 2, and 4 percent in rate year 3. DEP does propose to offset its requested increase with certain excess federal tax revenue dollars currently held by the Company.

2.1

DEP explains that customers should benefit from this new ratemaking approach from fewer rate cases, which would be required under the traditional ratemaking approach as the Company enters a period of time in which it plans to make significant capital investment. The Company also explains that the new ratemaking approach includes other customer protections, including an earnings sharing mechanism and performance incentive mechanisms intended to encourage the types of performance about which customers care.

Based on the increases proposed, DEP's application explains that a typical residential

customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours of electricity per month will see an increase of approximately \$14.72 -- \$14.72 per month in rate year 1. This amount will increase by approximately \$5.62 per month in rate year 2, and \$5.21 per month in rate year 3. In the event the Commission does not approve DEP's request to use performance-based regulation and a multi-year rate plan, but instead, applies traditional ratemaking principles to DEP's request, then a typical residential customer using 1,000-kilowatt hours will see an increase of approximately \$9.89 per month in base rates until DEP is due to file its next rate case.

2.1

DEP states that its request to increase its rates is driven by investments made since its 2019
Rate Case, including: investments in existing nuclear facilities to enhance safety, reliability, and efficiency over their extended life operations. New investments in traditional and renewable generation as well as energy storage; continued investments to maintain remaining coal-fired generation and hydroelectric generation; ongoing work to retire and close existing coal-fired generating facilities, and work to upgrade the transmission and distribution

systems to be more reliable, resilient, and supportive of renewable technologies.

2.1

On October 31st, 2022, the Commission issued an Order establishing general rate cases and suspending rates. And on December 16th, 2022, the Commission issued an Order scheduling investigation and hearings, establishing invention and testimony due dates, as well as discovery guidelines. The December 16th Order also required that DEP provide notice of its request to increase rates to its customers by mailing each of its customers notice of the rate increase and by publishing notice of the request in the newspaper.

On December 21, 2022, the Commission issued an Order revising the dates of the public witness hearings. Several hearings, such as the one tonight, have been scheduled at locations around the State for the purpose of receiving testimony from public witnesses addressing the proposed rate increase.

A hearing has been scheduled to begin on May 1st in Raleigh for the purpose of receiving testimony from the expert witnesses of the parties to the proceeding.

The Public Staff, which represents the Using

and Consuming Public, has been made a party to this case pursuant to North Carolina General Statute

Section § 62-15, and the Attorney General's Office has intervened in this case as well in accordance with North Carolina General Statute Section § 62-20.

2.1

In addition, the following parties have petitioned to and been allowed to intervene in this proceeding: Carolina Industrial Group for Fair Utility Rates II; The Carolina Utility Customers Association, Incorporated; North Carolina Justice Center; The North Carolina Housing Coalition; The Southern Alliance for Clean Energy; North Carolina Sustainable Energy Association; Vote Solar; The Natural Resources Defense Council; The Sierra Club; The Commercial Group; The Kroger Company; Harris Teeter, LLC; Fayetteville Public Works Commission, The Department of Defense and all other federal executive agencies jointly.

All right. That brings us to tonight. We appreciate your coming out tonight and voice your views on DEP's proposed rate increase. We welcome your testimony and we'd like to hear from you.

In conducting this hearing, the Commission will function in a judicial capacity as we're required to do under North Carolina law. We largely follow the

Rule of Civil Procedure and Evidence. And because the Commission functions as a court, we cannot respond to your questions, but we are here to receive evidence from you-all in the form of your testimony.

2.1

In this proceeding, the Public Staff, which represents the Using and Consuming Public, will investigate and make appropriate recommendations to the Commission regarding DEP's requests. The Public Staff represents you, that is the Using and Consuming Public, and will assist you-all in providing your testimony tonight. In addition, the Public Staff will file its own expert testimony in this case, setting forth its recommendations. That testimony is due to be filed on March 27th and will be available on our website, Commissioners' website for public viewing.

In order to facilitate a full and fair opportunity for everyone to speak tonight, we're going to use the following procedures:

- 1) Witnesses who wish to testify must sign up with the Public Staff. The Public Staff will call each witness in the order listed on the roster.
- 2) In order to allow each person an equal amount of time speak, there will be a limit of three minutes per speaker.

2.1

- 4) Please do your best to refrain from offering opinion on matters not related to issues included in the notice of hearing for this docket.

 Tell us how this request affects you or tell us about the quality of service you received from the Company.
- 5) Counsel for any party may ask questions of the witnesses who testify tonight. In addition, the Commission will have the opportunity to ask questions as well. This means that if you decide to provide testimony, you may be asked questions by attorneys for the parties or by the Commissioners.
- 6) Our testimony's being recorded by a court reporter tonight. So to ensure the accuracy of the record that she prepares, we ask that you not engage in unconventional modes testimony and do your best to remain quiet when you're not testifying so that she's

able to hear the testifying witness.

2.1

And as a final reminder, the Commission and attorneys for the parties are not allowed to answer your questions or respond to your questions during the hearing. However, both the Public Staff as well as DEP have representatives here tonight who will be available to talk to you-all after the hearing, if you do have questions.

With that, I think we're ready to begin, so I'm going to call upon counsel to identify themselves for the record. We begin with the Applicant.

Well, she's deceased now, so that cut another \$2,000 roughly out of the monthly budget. The gas company just doubled my gas bill. For now, they doubled it. I'm on equal pay just like I'm on equal pay with the power company as well. But to talk about the increase, I know it's over a three-year time span. But if I'm wrong, I'd be the first one to admit it.

The increase that's being asked, in my experience, and going by what the media will say, after the Company gets their raise and

rates or whatever is nine times out of ten, if there's a rate increase, if they ask for a rate increase, like in this instance, they're asking -- what is it, 17, 18 percent, something like that? That's a false statement.

2.1

Nine times out of ten, it's like if they ask for that percentage, that's really -- to my understanding, that's not really what the percentage that the Company -- what is as far as Duke Progress Energy or any other company, nine times out of ten, that rate increase they ask for is not the real increase that they're asking for. They do that because they know that the Commission is not going to accept the amount that they're saying.

Usually, it's a lower -- I guess a lower increase or whatever, but it's the real increase that they actually want and not this like, say, 17 or 19 percent that they're asking for. They don't really want that. They'll accept less, nine times out off ten. And -- but like I said, you know, I know everything is getting expensive nowadays, but it really hurts the monthly budget for increases.

1	So, like, with the gas company,
2	they sent me a letter saying they were going to
3	double my gas bill. I'm thinking my God, you
4	know, what else is going to happen. And then,
5	you know, all companies ask for rate increases.
6	And I may be wrong, but regardless, regardless of
7	what's said here tonight, they're going to I
8	mean, the rate increase is no doubt. They
9	know I mean, they know they're going to get
10	it.
11	But I do appreciate them keeping
12	my lights on in my house. It's not a mansion,
13	but it keeps me dry. But I just want to thank
14	you-all for listening to what I had to say, and
15	thank you-all as well.

20	have about 250 basically a month left to spend
21	after taxes, room and internet, and that's if I
22	make 15 an hour, but I have less than that if I
23	make 11. I still have to pay lights, food, gas
24	for the car, car insurance. And thank goodness I

don't have to pay for all of my son's formula, but it's still about 23 to \$25 a can.

My son needs 13 cans a month. A week gives me seven. I also have a mother who has breast cancer and she's on a fixed income.

And I don't know if people understand what power of attorney is but they should have told me what me signing up to be her full durable power of attorney meant. That meant me taking on some expenses I didn't know I had to do.

So basically, I'm asking for Duke to stop the \$14 fee. What is the storm recovery fee, the storm recovery fee? There's also another fee, an energy rider fee. Sorry. I skipped a little bit. Okay. And in Person County, I am going to give just a little bit backdrop. What I've learned is that the Housing Authority only pays \$500 a month for a family of two if the child's less than three years old, with rising costs, you know. And with work first, it's only a matter of two thirty-six.

Person County, Durham County, and Wake County has seen an increase in request for help with paying their light bill. I've actually

witnessed it myself going down there.

My tired is tired, and I feel like I should not have to choose between food this month and how much electricity I can use. As of right now, my seven month-old is with his Godparents. My heat/AC unit is off when the nights have actually been at 40 and below. I had the thermostat on 60 and the light bill was still over \$100. I already don't have enough internet to work from home, so I have to travel to Durham for work. I come from Durham County, from an older home, and my electricity bill was lower with my other two children who are now 18 and 22. And now, it's just me and my last child who is almost eight months old. So I'm honestly tired.

The increases, I'm actually also now looking to move because I no longer want to deal with Duke. It's nice for the charity that Duke does, but we as customers pay for that, really, I feel. I can barely afford the \$14 fee. So to me, I feel like I'm speaking for the ones who are not getting more of an increase as far as the income but rather than less. But I also feel like why should I have to choose basically to be
