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PROCEEDINGS

COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Good evening. Let us come to order and go on the record. I am

Commissioner Karen M. Kemerait and I am the Presiding

Commissioner for these proceedings.

I now call for hearing two proceedings that have been consolidated, and those proceedings are Docket Number E-34, Sub 54, which is the Application of Appalachian State University d/b/a New River Light and Power Company for Adjustment of General Base Rates and Charges for Electric Service, and, also, Docket Number E-34, Sub 55, which is In The Matter of Application by New River Light and Power Company for an Accounting Order to Defer Certain Capital Costs and New Tax Expenses. I will refer to New River Light and Power Company as the Applicant going forward.

On June 29, 2022, the Applicant filed a Notice of Intention to file an Application for a General Rate Case.

On November 18, 2022, the Applicant filed a Petition seeking an Accounting Order to allow it to defer certain expenses to a regulatory asset.

On December 22, 2022, the Applicant filed an Application with the Commission seeking authority to

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increase its rates for electric service in its service
territory in Watauga County, North Carolina, which I
will refer to going forward as the "Application for a
Rate Case".
          On January 11, 2023, the Commission issued
an Order Establishing a General Rate Case and
Suspending Rates.
          On January 18, 2023, the Applicant filed a
Motion to Consolidate Dockets E-34, Subs 54 and 55.
          On February 1, 2023, the Commission issued
an Order Granting the Motion to Consolidate Dockets.
          On January 18, 2023, Petitions to Intervene
by Appalachian Voices were filed in both Dockets, and
those Dockets were E-34, Subs 54 and 55.
          On February 1st, 2023, the Commission
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allowed Appalachian Voices to intervene.

On March 20th, 2023, the Commission issued an Order Scheduling Hearing, Establishing Procedural and Filing Requirements and Requiring Customer Notice. The Order scheduled today's hearing for the purpose of taking public witness testimony.

On March 28, 2023, the Commission issued an Order Requiring Corrected Customer Notice and Requiring Amended Application Schedules to be Filed.

- Also on March 28, 2023, the Commission (sic) filed
 Amended Exhibits B and C to the Application.
- On April 10, 2023, the Applicant filed the
 Updated Costs and Amended Exhibits of Witness Randall
 E. Halley's direct testimony.
- On April 24, 2023, the Applicant filed an Affidavit of Publication of Customer Notice.

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- On April 25, 2023, Appalachian Voices filed a Motion to Adjust Schedule of the Expert Witness Hearing.
- On May 2nd, 2023, the Commission issued an Order Denying that Motion.
- On May 2nd, 2023, the Applicant filed a

 Certificate of Service showing that the corrected

 customer notice has been provided, and also filed

 amended Exhibits A, B, and C of the Application.
 - And that procedural history brings us to today.
- Pursuant to the State Government Ethics Act,
 members of the Commission have a duty to avoid
 conflicts of interest. And let the record reflect
 that I have no such conflict.
- I now call upon counsel for the parties to announce their appearance for the record, beginning

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1 | with the Applicant.
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MR. DROOZ: Commissioner Kemerait and customers of New River, my name is David Drooz with the Fox Rothschild Law Firm and I am appearing on behalf of New River Light and Power.

MR. CREECH: Commissioner Kemerait, my name is William Creech, a Staff Attorney with the Public Staff Utilities Commission and I am representing the Using and Consuming Public. At the appropriate time, I will have a brief opposing statement.

COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: And before we get started, do the parties have any preliminary matters that need to be addressed?

MR. DROOZ: None from New River.

MR. CREECH: None from the Public Staff.

COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: And would you like to go ahead and provide an opening statement, if you wish to do so.

MR. DROOZ: The Applicant does not have an opening statement.

MR. CREECH: Commissioner Kemerait, again,
William Creech with the Public Staff. I simply wanted
to administratively give welcome to every one here
this evening.

As I indicated I am a Staff Attorney with the Public Staff. The Public Staff is an independent state agency that represents the Using and Consuming Public in matters before the Utilities Commission.

The Public Staff has been auditing the New River Light and Power operations and its rate increase Application. We have a team of engineers, accountants and economists, and attorneys investigating the request and are reviewing the records and operations. We are scheduled to file our testimony and exhibits setting our position regarding the requested increase in early June.

The Company's Application, and our testimony, and other party's filings are available for your review on the Commission's website along with other documents related to the case. That's NCUC.gov. You can just put in the docket number, E-34, Sub 54 and E-34, Sub 55.

The purpose of the hearing this evening is to hear from customers regarding the requested rate increase. We'll call each of you who have indicated on the sign-up sheet that you wish to make a statement and when your name is called, you'll be sworn or affirmed. Next, you will be asked your name, address

and whether you are a New River Light and Power customer. We ask that you speak clearly so that the court reporter may make an accurate record of your statement. And, of course, we do appreciate your being here tonight.

Members of the Public Staff will remain here after the hearing tonight to speak with you if you'd like, as I imagine perhaps the Utility will as well.

I'm joined this evening by several highly experienced colleagues of mine. Two engineers, James McLawhorn who is the Director of our Energy Division, as well as another senior leader in the Energy Division, Jack Floyd; and then the head of our Economic Research Division, Bob Hinton. Thank you.

COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Thank you,

Mr. Creech. And since there are no preliminary

matters we'll go ahead and proceed with the hearing.

And I have some additional information to provide in addition to what Mr. Creech has just provided.

First, I'd like to say that we appreciate you coming here tonight to voice your views on this important matter. We welcome your testimony and we want to hear from you.

In conducting this hearing, the Commission

functions in a judicial capacity as we are required to do by North Carolina Law. Because the Commission functions as a court, we cannot respond to your questions. Instead, we are here to receive evidence from you in the form of your testimony.

The Public Staff which represents the Using and Consuming Public is made a party to this proceeding pursuant to North Carolina General Statute § 62-15(d). In this proceeding, the Public Staff represents you, the Using and Consuming Public, and the Public Staff will assist you in providing your testimony this evening.

In order to facilitate a full and fair opportunity for all speakers to participate, we will use the following procedures. First, witnesses who wish to testify must sign up with the Public Staff. The Public Staff will call each witness in the order listed on the roster.

Second, in order to allow each person an equal amount of time, there will be a limit of three minutes for each witness to speak; therefore, we would appreciate it if witnesses would try to avoid cumulative, repetitive, and redundant testimony. And as you will see, there will be a clock that is set for

three minutes and you can watch when your time is up as you are testifying.

Third, to comply with the Rules of Procedure and Evidence, each witness must swear or affirm the truth that his or her testimony prior to providing that testimony. When you hear your name called, please proceed to the stand which is to the left of me and I will deliver the oath. If you prefer to affirm your testimony, please let me know when you come to the stand. After your testimony has been sworn or affirmed, I will ask you to please state your name and address for the evidentiary record and then you may provide your testimony.

Fourth, please refrain from offering opinions on matters that are not related to the Applicant's Application which is before the Commission in these dockets. Also, please be sure to address your testimony to me as the Presiding Commissioner and not to members of the audience. In lieu of oral testimony, you may submit written testimony so long as you swear to its accuracy. Written statements must be submitted by a person under oath during this hearing.

Fifth, if you wish to testify this evening, counsel for any party may ask questions of you. In

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addition, I will have the opportunity to ask questions. This means that if you provide testimony you might be asked questions by the attorneys or by me as the Presiding Commissioner.
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Sixth, the testimony is being recorded by the court reporter. To ensure the accuracy of the record, we ask you that you speak clearly and not engage in any types of unconventional modes of testimony. Additionally, I would appreciate it if you remain quiet when you're not testifying to make sure the court reporter is able to hear the testifying witness.

And then, again, as a final reminder, the Commission and the attorneys for the parties are not allowed to respond to any questions during the hearing. However, as Mr. Creech mentioned, both the Public Staff and the Applicant have representatives here who will be available after the hearing to answer questions. So with that being said, let's begin.

Mr. Creech, can you call the first witness, please.

MR. CREECH: Yes. I'd call Richard Gray.

COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Please place your left hand on the Bible and raise your right.

COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Would you begin by stating your name and address for the record?

THE WITNESS: Yes. My name is Richard Gray
and I live at 283 Westbrook in Boone. And I am a
customer of New River Light and Power.

COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Please proceed with your statement.

11 DIRECT STATEMENT BY THE WITNESS:

Thank you. Thank you for the opportunity of testifying. What I have come here this evening for is to speak against the request or the proposal of New River Light and Power to charge small rooftop solar providers a charge of \$6.17 per kilowatt of their systems.

I have had a 12-solar panel installation on my rooftop for about 15 years. I receive some -- this is linked into the grid so, essentially, what happens is New River Light and Power purchases my power and then turns it around and sells that power back to the public. And I would just like to give you some statistics on this. So, because my solar panel

installation is 2.5 kilowatts, that means that this charge will be \$15.43 per month or that works out to be about \$185 per year that I will have to pay to New River Light and Power for the privilege of providing clean solar energy to Boone and that is what I protest.

Let me just give you a few figures that I think will illustrate that New River Light and Power really has no justification whatsoever to charge this extra amount.

So, for instance, I receive from New River
Light and Power 2.6 cents per kilowatt hour. New
River Light and Power turns around and sells that to
the public for 8.9 cents to the public. And so what
that means is that New River Light and Power makes a
profit of about 6.3 cents for every kilowatt hour that
I produce. And so they are actually making a lot of
money off of the power that I produce.

Now, New River Light and Power, of course, offers a Green Power Program which they state is to bring renewable carbon-free energy to the high country. What they did is for households that take that option on, they charge -- they levy a charge of \$5 per 250-kilowatt hours. That works out to the two

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    cents per kilowatt hour which is very, very close to
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    what I get from New River Light and Power. And so,
 3
    essentially, New River Light and Power for providing
 4
    green energy to the people of Boone pays me or,
 5
    essentially, has a charge of six-tenths for one sent
 6
    and then they turn around and pay and charge 8.9 cents
 7
    to the public plus a $5 surcharge.
               So I find that it is absurd that New River
 8
9
    Light and Power is charging an extra $185 to me and
10
    the similar rooftop solar providers in Boone for the
11
    privilege of producing the green power that they go
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    back around and sell at an extra cost to the public in
13
    Boone. So I think that they have no justification
14
    whatsoever for this charge. Thank you very much.

    been -- you've had it for 15 years?

              THE WITNESS: About 15 years. Yes.

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1 Q Mr. Gray, you have some statistics in your hand. 2 Is that something you would like to mark as an 3 exhibit and place into the record. 4 Α I did not bring it along but I can provide a 5 typical bill from New River Light and Power 6 showing exactly how much they give me for a 7 kilowatt hour, and it is 2.6 cents. 8 Is that -- and that maybe -- for purposes of 9 tonight's hearing, would you like to place what 10 you have there in the record? What I have right here? 11 12 Yes, sir. 13 It's basically what I said. I don't have that 14 bill along but I can still provide it. Or New 15 River Light and Power can certainly can provide 16 it as well. 17 If you will be sticking around tonight we can 18 talk to you about that. 19 Okay. I can do that. 20 MR. CREECH: Thank you, Mr. Gray. 21 COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Thank you, Mr. Gray. 22 You may be excused. 23 Please call the next witness. 24 MR. CREECH: David Jackson.

19	DIRECT STATEMENT BY THE WITNESS:
20	I would just really like to take the
21	opportunity here this evening to speak on behalf of
22	the community interest that we have come to know from
23	New River Light and Power being in business here since
21	the nineteen-teens

I can tell you in the near seven years that I've been a president of the Boone Area Chamber of Commerce, we have come to know New River Light and Power and Appalachian State University as good corporate and community citizens, whether that is educating the public on the different programs that they offer and that is the Green Power Program that they mentioned this evening or other things that New River does to ensure reliability for our community.

I think that's one thing that our community is and a benefit to others is the fact that due to our weather concerns, we have plenty of opportunities whether it's winter snow storms, summer thunderstorms, to lose power and lose reliability for the business interests and the residents of our community, and we have very little problem with that. New River delivers in that regard. They train their staff appropriately to be able to handle the unique conditions here. I think they may have been proactive in helping us expand our capabilities as our community has grown quite a bit over the last several years.

We have known the staff at New River to be responsive when we have had members that have had issues with New River. Picking up the phone and

    calling their staff has been an easy thing for us to
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         Sometimes the conversations aren't always easy
 3
    but they hear us. They hear from those members and
 4
    they are quick to respond in the ways that we ask them

    to.

              So, on behalf of the organization that I

    represent, the Boone Area Chamber of Commerce, and the

    community in general, I thank New River for doing what

    you do. It's not easy work, I understand that, but it

23	DIRECT STATEMENT BY THE WITNESS:
24	I want everyone to know I am the property

owner association president at University Village here in Boone. It's an R-1 subdivision with 92 lots, 76 heads of households and over 200 residents. The UV was spawn back in the late 1960's. So many of you may be familiar with it.

The last few years, since 2021, New River
Light and Power performed extensive work in burying
our power lines. The need to convert overhead power
lines to underground was evident in our subdivision.
We've had many large mature trees in the UV. And in
my 20 years there, we've had countless outages due to
fallen trees from things like landfall hurricanes, ice
storms, and other intense weather events.

responsive to this need. I worked closely with Matt Makdad, the engineering supervisor on the project and his team. Matt and his team were excellent to work with. They met with me on several occasions during the planning and construction phases of the project. Matt joined us in our Zoom sessions, our UV Board meetings, and was very responsive to our concerns and requests. The conversion went very smoothly and everyone in the UV is very happy with how it worked out. So I think it's obvious that New River Light and

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Power provides a strong and valuable source to the community.
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The relocation of the overhead power lines 3 4 to underground was very beneficial to the reliability 5 by reducing and, to this date, eliminating outages. 6 The conversion was done professionally, including 7 strong communication with the community throughout the 8 entire conversion process. And so on behalf of the UV 9 I can say that it's obvious that New River Light and 10 Power cares about their partnership with our 11 community, and I trust that they will continue to 12 listen and be responsive to the input from our 13 neighborhood and the broader community, including 14 statements stated this evening. Thank you. 15 COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Mr. Thaxton, what 16 year was -- what year did -- was the under-grounding 17 of power lines performed? 18

              THE WITNESS: I'm Perry Yates and I live on

    789 Stadium Drive in Boone North Carolina. And I am a

    New River Light and Power customer from a residential

    standpoint. I have a prepared statement. And it's
22
    been a long day so I may read it. It's just notes is
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    all it is so I'm going to try to read what it says.
24
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DIRECT STATEMENT BY THE WITNESS:

I'm pleased with the level of service and reliability that I have grown to expect. And as a local business owner and a former County Commissioner, I understand that the customer choice is important.

New River Light and Power's approach to renewable energy means customer have a choice to install their own generation and are paid the value of what they generate. If the customer does not want or cannot install a solar energy to their home, they shouldn't be asked to help pay for the neighbors' home that is going to install the solar panels.

I'm all for renewable energy. I believe in it. I think if you net that down to 2.6 and you're charging 8.9, I'm only paying four point something per kilowatt for my energy. Also, the service of New River Light and Power has been outstanding in my area. When the high storms come, the snow comes, they are there. They are on the spot. They got me back on and ready to go. And I can live comfortably.

I know in the 2009 ice storm, when that came through, I think it was 2009, I lived in town and I got a backup generator and we only had to run it for about 24-hours before our lights came on. And it was a disaster. It looked like a bomb had went off up

here.

I also believe that in giving the customers their choice. If they want to make the solar panels -- and I respect your information for that. I looked into that as well and it's very costly as well to do that. That should be their option and to sell it back. But I guess what I look at on the rate increase is from the standpoint, when the power -- and I've researched this enough to know that if the power goes off on the grid you've got to shut your grid down. And you can't be on when they're coming to work on the grid.

So, with inflation, with rising costs and trucks and utilities, and I know that from owning a business, you just can't stay at the same rate forever and maintain a good infrastructure, and maintain a good power grid, and do all of that. So, if the power goes down, we've got to pay those people to come out there and turn the power back on. And we've got to pay those people to repair those lines that aren't underground. You're very fortunate to have that underground in the University Village. And that was a good project. I remember that happening.

But, you know, we look at this, and in

today's society, we can't maintain the level of service that's being demanded by growth in our area. And I don't like price increases as much as anybody but common sense will show you, and I'm running a hardware store, and if I'm selling a hammer for \$10 and a guy comes in and tries to sell it to me for \$10, I don't have my labor, my cost, my overhead, my building lease, and all of that figured in to that. can't turn around and sell the hammer for the same \$10 I paid for it and stay in business. I mean, it's just that simple.

So when we look at this I think that it's been a very good company and has done a great job with the expansion that the Town of Boone has had. In the past, I've been a resident -- I'm 60-years-old and I've been a resident all the 60 years of my life. And it's kept up within the city limits and in the extra territorials on and jurisdiction has kept up very, very well at a good low rate of power. I don't know how you guys have done it. I mean, look across the street and see this thing coming in, the University expands, the public expands, the student housing expands, the residential keeps expanding, and you can't build power grids to meet the demand unless you

- 1 have some kind of money, and at the same time maintain
- 2 | the quality level of service that they maintained.
- 3 And I just want to thank you guys for doing that and
- 4 offering to help people learn how to build their own
- 5 | solar energy. And if they can furnish their homes
- 6 | with their solar energy, I think that's fantastic.
- 7 And I appreciate you offering to do that as an
- 8 | alternative to buying power of y'all, which tells me
- 9 you are caring about the green energy coming down the
- 10 pipe.

- 23 | Q Mr. Yates, I was just -- you made some comments
- about solar, renewable. Could you restate your

point there, if you could, on the cost and what you think customers out to bear and what -
I know I talked to a gentleman Friday night that did this a couple of years ago and his solar panels cost, I think he told me \$35,000, and that's a lot of money. And, you know, he's -- if you pay \$35,000, it's going to take Mr. Gray a long time to get his money back at 2.6 kilowatts. And I think he said New River is charging 9, so I think there's a difference of around four something there; just off the top of my head.

But when the power goes off, say New River loses power, he's got to shut his solar panels down as well for the repairman to come in there and fix that. Those repairmen can't come in there for free. And I'm having a hard time keeping employees now because people -- it's an employee market and that's great. People have been under-paid in this area for a long time. But they don't come out for anything and he's got fantastic people coming out. But if you were on a solar system just by yourself with battery backup and everything and not attached to the

1	grid, then you wouldn't have to shut your house
2	down. And I am building a cabin right now and
3	I'm looking at solar energy entirely for that.
4	MR. CREECH: Thank you.
5	COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Thank you for your

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partner and I refinanced our home about three years ago and we set aside about $30,000 to put solar on our house. We believe strongly in clean energy and we want to do our part to reduce the use of carbon fuels. The buy-all/sell-all policies of New River at that time have already been described by Mr. Gray, and they are a great disincentive to put in solar on a house that just doesn't pay.
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New River does pay more than the old rate for the power that we would put into the grid but the \$6.17 per kilowatt would come to a -- it's an enormous amount of money. For example, if we can put 10 kilowatts on our roof, that's \$61 a month. And then you -- that's about \$740 a year. And if you multiply that out by the life span -- I'm sorry, the numbers -- I was sort of crunching when I got in here. At the rate of pay -- at the rate of our utility usage that we can currently -- we think we can generate with 10 kilowatts, we can generate about 40 percent of our own usage, so we can save about \$1,200 a year. The system costs \$30,000 so it takes about 25 years to pay it off.

If you add on the \$6.17 per kilowatt rate,

- 1 that comes to \$740 a year. So that's going to push
- 2 our time of paying off to 43 years rather than 25
- 3 | years. I'm not going to be here in 43 years.
- 4 Twenty-five is hard enough.
- 5 So, it can be a considered to be a
- 6 deliberate disincentive to have homeowners put rooftop
- 7 | solar on their house. I don't see any other way you
- 8 can interpret that. And just look around, do you see
- 9 | solar in Boone? No, you don't see it. If this sort
- 10 of policy was nationwide, you probably wouldn't see
- 11 | any in the whole country. So I'm strongly against
- 12 this proposal. That's it.
- COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Does the Applicant
- 14 have any questions for Mr. James?
- MR. DROOZ: No questions. Thank you.
- 16 EXAMINATION BY MR. CREECH:
- 17 Q Mr. James, just to clarify, you indicated that
- you paid approximately \$30,000 for your solar
- 19 panels?
- 20 A We haven't done it yet. That's what we set aside
- and that's what we got -- we estimate that's
- going to the cost of it.
- 23 Q You estimate that under the existing program that
- you would be able to save about \$1,200 a year.

1	But under the change, you would save about \$500 a
2	year; is that correct? And so the difference of
3	\$700 per year?
4	A Right. If I understand your question correctly,
5	there's no doubt that if we have 10 kilowatts
6	then we're charged six was it \$6.17 per
7	kilowatt, that we will spend \$740.40 per year as
8	a fee to have that solar on the roof. So that
9	takes away from any money that we might save on
10	our electric bill.
11	Q So the payback period is extended from 20-some
12	odd years to approximately forty-some odd years?
13	A Exactly.
14	MR. CREECH: Thank you.
15	COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Thank you for your
16	testimony. You may be excused.
17	THE WITNESS: Thank you.
18	MR. CREECH: Jeff Deal, D-E-A-L.
19	COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Good evening,
20	Mr. Deal. Please place your left hand on the Bible
21	and raise your right hand.
22	JEFF DEAL;
23	having been duly sworn,
24	testified as follows:

COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: State your name and address for the record, please.

THE WITNESS: My name is Jeff Deal. My address is 220 Tall Timber Trail, Boone, North Carolina. I am a proud member of New River Light and Power.

COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Thank you. Please go ahead and give your statement.

THE WITNESS: Thank you.

DIRECT STATEMENT BY THE WITNESS:

I just wanted to state that I've been very pleased with the service I've received from New River Light and Power since I've been a customer for over 20 years now. They patterned with us on one of the first solar systems in Boone at the King House which is a business here just off King Street, and they were fantastic partners. That's why this particular policy they're now proposing is so shocking to me. It seems incredibly unfair.

First of all, I just want to say that I haven't seen any math or arithmetic from New River Light and Power that supports a \$6.17 per kilowatt charge on a solar system that their customer buys and assumes full cost for installing. So, if they want to

propose this I think they need to explain line item exactly how they came to that incredibly heavy charge for somebody who's investing tens of thousands of dollars in the property. So we need to see that. Maybe it's been provided and I've missed it but I've not seen it anywhere. So, I would ask the Utilities Commission to make sure that's provided in line item in the way that we the customers can easily understand.

My second point is \$6.17 per kilowatt is a flat fee. If I install a solar system in a not-shaded area with no trees, it's going to produce a lot more than if I install it on my house where I have trees and shade and I'm going to get about half as much production from that solar system as I would if I put it in full sun.

New River Light and Power basically mandates that a customer have a second meter for them that tracks the production of the solar system such that they know how much to pay avoided costs for the power their customer produces. I don't have any problem with them charging less -- paying a wholesale rate for that power. I think that's complete fair.

I do have a problem with the flat fee that's

not based on the production of the system when New River Light and Power knows exactly what the production of the system is and they should base it on the production of the system, not a flat fee. If my solar system goes offline for six months because an inverter goes down and I can't get another inverter and it doesn't produce a single kilowatt hour, New River Light and Power is asking me to pay for six months when my system has produced nothing. That is incredibly unfair. I mean, there is just no other way to put that.

So a flat rate just does not work. It's a nonstarter. They pay based on production for the electricity that we produce, the solar generators.

They should also base whatever fee that may be fairly assessed, and I'm not sure there is one that's merited here. But if a fee is assessed for a solar system, it should be based on production in exactly the way they pay for power now. So if New River Light and Power wants to put a system on my house, a solar system at their cost, I will happily pay them to do that. But if I put a solar system on my house, I shouldn't be further disincentive and further penalized for investing my own personal property. I mean, I think

this is just one of the hallmarks of what it is to be an American personal property. And I do not think any institution of government or otherwise, in this case

New River Light and Power should have the power to assess me basically what amounts to an unfair tax on my property. So I have to say that I am pretty disappointed in the way that this has been done.

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So it also, I think, goes against a lot of the sustainability initiatives that the University, the Appalachian State University is out there promoting, which I agree with. I think they have a fantastic technology program and sustainable development program, and I think renewable energy production is part of that, and I think for the University to promote this and then to turn around and charge with a utility they own a \$6.17 per kilowatt hour flat rate on somebody's personal property is just morally inconsistent. I mean, that's just the nicest I can be about it. I mean incredibly unfair. have to say very surprising for me for as somebody who's worked with New River Light and Power in the past and been very satisfied and very happy with the service I've received. Nothing but good things to say about them just about up until this moment.

2 EXAMINATION BY MR. CREECH:

My question related to some of your comments on the map as well. I'm a lawyer not an accountant or engineer, but I have colleagues who are here and who will be looking at the record on this matter.

When you say you want to look behind the numbers and inputs, what are the types of inputs that you have in mind?

A Yeah. I mean, so for solar energy say, as an example, if I put solar in my house and New River buys it from me, they don't have to install anymore transmission distribution to get that power so that's a saving to them so that should go in my favor.

Now, if they were planning on me buying a certain amount of power from them, and my solar system is going to cause that not to happen, and they're basing their rates on that, I get that, you know, that that would go on their electric. But I need to see a line item breakdown - everything they're paying and everything they're getting and then what it nets

1	out as, you know, just line item; every single
2	factor that goes into whatever assessment that
3	fee is determined to be.
4	MR. CREECH: Thank you.
5	COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Thank you for your
6	testimony. You may be excused.

DIRECT STATEMENT BY THE WITNESS:

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I want to first thank New River Light and Power for their service. I certainly appreciate it. But this isn't about service. This is about rooftop solar and whether or not we are going to have any in I mean, look around, we don't have any. buy-all/sell-all, the current system, I call buy-all kill all solar because that's exactly what it does. And if you go ahead and Google buy-all/sell-all solar in the United States, you will find exactly no utility that really uses that because it doesn't work. means no solar. And so the choice that we're given by New River Light and Power which is an exorbitant rate of \$6.17 per kilowatt, we've seen what happens when utilities do that because they've done it before and they've done it in states that I've worked in like Arizona. And what happened when they raised the price like that is solar installations, rooftop, went down 95 percent; 95 percent in one year. So if we want to continue to have zero rooftop solar in Boone like we do now, then by all means charge that but it's going to kill solar. Look around. We don't have any. really sad.

I've been doing this work now for almost 20

years all across the country. Here in North Carolina we have far more solar than sunny Arizona where I lived for most of my life. And the reason is because their policies are so awful. They kill solar. So our question is not is New River Light and Power doing a good job. Yes, I appreciate it. Yes, I appreciate the under-grounding lines. But I don't appreciate the fact that they are a monopoly utility that is tying me and everyone I know to fossil fuels for the next 15 years.

New River Light and Power has surveys that go back probably 20 years. Over and over and over and over and over Boone residents have said "we want solar". About 25 percent of the power goes to App State. The rest of it goes to homes and businesses in New River Light and Power's district and they really don't seem to listen to us at all.

The other thing I want to mention is they are tying us to natural gas for 15 years. There is a climate scientist named Kevin Anderson who says, natural gas is a bridge fuel to four degrees Cel. rate in rising temperature. So look at your grandkids. I know I have a couple myself, grandkids. Look at them and impose on them a 2-degree C world and then a 3C

and then a 4C world because it's coming. They're saying 1.5 by 2027. Two to 3C maybe by 2040. We're not going to have life as we know it past 2 degrees. So, I'm going to bring this up, even though perhaps climate change is something people don't want to talk about, when New River Light and Power is tying all of us to natural gas for 15 years, you've got tons of volatility, you've got staggering emissions, you've got enormous climate change effects, and we can't do anything because they are a monopoly utility and we can't go outside of that. I mean, when I listen at App State's defining sustainability since 1899. Are you kidding me? If the rest of the United States had the rules that New River Light and Power did we'd have no energy efficiency in this country, we'd have no utility scale solar, we'd have no rooftop solar, and we'd have no wind; we'd have nothing.

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And so this is not personal. This -- I do this work because I care about the future and I care that we're killing the planet. And we're killing it with natural gas. And that's really a problem. And rooftop solar -- I want to say one last thing,

Commissioner Kemerait. You know Lazard. Lazard is the word on levelized cost of electricity. Lazard.

- 1 And Lazard says that the cost of rooftop PV comes in
- 2 at 4.9 to 18.5 cents per kilowatt hour unsubsidized
- 3 and 3.2 to 15.5 cents subsidized. We can do this. We
- 4 choose not to. And unfortunately, our utilities are
- 5 choosing for us and our children. Thank you.
- 6 COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Thank you. Wait
- 7 just one moment. There might be some questions. Any
- 8 | questions from the Applicant?
- 9 MR. DROOZ: Yes.
- 10 EXAMINATION BY MR. DROOZ:
- 11 Q Ms. LaPlaca, are you familiar with the Green
- 12 Power Program offered by New River?
- 13 A Yes, I am.
- 14 Q And do you understand that you have the choice of
- subscribing to that if you wish to use non-fossil
- 16 energy?
- 17 A Yes, I do, but I choose not to because I want my
- power local. That's what I want. Local
- 19 distributed clean energy. Not hydro.
- 20 Q Thank you.
- 21 EXAMINATION BY MR. CREECH:
- 22 Q Ms. LaPlaca, you mentioned a figure of 95 percent
- in your comments. What was the source of that?
- 24 A I'll be happy to send it to you. Salt River

They raise 1 Project in Arizona is the utility. 2 their fees to \$50 a month. I think it was \$50 3 flat. Installations went down 95 percent. 4 Arizona Public Service Company killed retail net 5 metering in 2013. A very sad day. 6 basically, rooftop installations went down 7 95 percent. And I'm happy to send you that information. I've used it in many talks and 9 presentations. 10 Thank you, Ms. LaPlaca. One more question. You

- Thank you, Ms. LaPlaca. One more question. You talked about volatility.
- 12 A Yeah.

11

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- Q Can you with speak to that?
- 14 Yeah. Natural gas, I mean, it's -- you know, in 15 2008 natural gas spiked to about \$13 a million 16 Natural gas is extremely volatile right 17 Twenty years ago, our country was 2 or 18 4 percent natural gas power. Now it's 40. Same 19 with North Carolina. We were 2 or 4 percent 20 natural gas 20 years ago. Now we're 40 percent 21 natural gas. So we are tied to that cost. As we 22 export more and more natural gas because Russia 23 is getting shut down and more gets turned to LNG. 24 LNG is even worse for emissions. It's like five

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times worse for emissions because you're constantly compressing this gas and re-gasifying it and putting it on a ship and leaking all over the place. And so basically what we're doing is we're looking at a future with more and more natural gas volatility, right, and the growing possibility and virtual near certainty that we're going to be running out. We need to plan ahead so that we can replace that natural gas because if we start paying what Europeans paid last year for natural gas-fired power, those bills of New River Light and Power are going to be triple and quadruple like they have all over Europe.

COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Thank you. You
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may -- unless Mr. Creech has more questions. You may; be excused.

THE WITNESS: Sure. My name is Steve Owen. 6 I live at 208 Apple Blossom Lane. That's Boone, North 7 Carolina.

COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Please go ahead and provide your statement.

10 THE WITNESS: Sure.

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DIRECT STATEMENT BY THE WITNESS:

So I live in the ETJ which used to be sort of the Town, although my residential power comes from Blue Ridge, but I have several properties that are serviced by New River. And I just want to go back to, this was referenced just a little bit earlier, about 2002, 2007, 2008, somewhere right in there, we worked with New River. We had a very small 2.4 kilowatt solar project on a building I have an ownership interest the next block down here, and our intent was to demonstrate a model where we could own solar cooperatively, we, our community members, and so we worked with New River and come to find out we were ready to interconnect it and New River said, "oh, we

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don't have an interconnection standard". So this project was referenced earlier by a Jeff Deal, provoked this buy-all/sell-all interconnection standard that everybody knows about now. That was 2007 or '08. I forget exactly when that was.
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In the meantime, up until fairly recently,

I've been involved in doing solar developments, mostly
and unfortunately out of the State of North Carolina,
doing nonprofit solar development for schools,
churches, that sort of thing, for any tax exempt
entity. And we always called that the "high hanging
fruit" because as hard as solar is to actually
develop, developing solar, having a church or a school
or some other community institution or agency own it,
it's a pretty stout uphill challenge, as has been
mentioned a number of times. Solar isn't cheap.
Although it's come down a heck of a lot since we
started in 2007 or '08. It's come down by a lot.

I didn't come prepared for a quantitative information. But one of the things I've seen through developing a lot of these projects is a lot of spreadsheets; we've worked with a lot of boards at a lot of these institutions; and looked at really what is the value to them, solar on their roof or out at

their cow pasture, or on their lawn. And we have a

pretty good idea of what it takes to kill solar and in

this case six seventeen for a kilowatt hour,

regardless of what it actually may produce. Maybe

I'll buy a used system and its production capacity is

going to diminish over five or 10 years. That's a

steeper penalty for me, that six seventeen per

kilowatt.

So I believe we've seen a lot of projects and there are a lot of little death by thousand cuts that tend to really -- the term that we came to hate was "it just doesn't pencil", and A lot of it really don't. If you're looking at just the economics, they just don't. Six, you know, twelve, eighteen, twenty, whatever, however much you have installed, that adds up. That is a big deal. So, I -- you know, I think it's just a killer as other folks have mentioned. I very much am not in favor of it.

I've been thinking about my grandparents a lot lately and they were people that thrift. I learned thrift from them. They were country people. Very smart, knew how to do everything. And I think about the gardens that my grandmother grew. And I think about the analogy here with New River. To me,

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    it sort of plays out like this. We can grow a garden,
 2
    grow our tomatoes and grow a few things for the summer
 3
    and enjoy that. And I don't expect to go to the
 4
    grocery store and them tell me I've got to pay an
 5
    extra six bucks to come in the store. I'm still
 6
    buying food. I'm still buying staples from them.

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    for me, it just seems really a lot to go into my

I did not prepare anything. I think that we've heard some pretty amazing testimony. I represent your fairly uninformed, I could say ignorant, homeowner in the Town of Boone.

When I started to think -- and I have children and they're thinking about having children so climate change is important to me. I hope it's important to all of us.

So I have friends who live in the county and they are putting up solar and I thought oh, what a great idea. I have a building with four apartments and I have people living there who are struggling already to pay their rent. Utilities went up.

So I have been asking and trying to figure out, again, a pretty -- what I consider ignorant in this area -- what's going on? Why? And I'm going to

ask you because I don't understand. So I'm not telling you anything, I'm asking you. How is that — how is it that Blue Ridge Electric is managing this and we're not. How is that New River Light and Power is connected to the University and promotes sustainability and we're not going to get anywhere with it? I don't know. It seems to me to be what I would call "a sham", and it's embarrassing.

I would like to put solar on my house. Oh, one more thing. Someone said something about you shouldn't have to pay for what you don't get. Right. Like, you know what, there are a lot of things I pay for that I don't get. Schools: I will pay for the schools until the day I leave, until the day I die. I don't have any children in the school system. So I think that that -- that is something that is really un-American because we do -- instead of thinking about individuals, we need to think about community. And we do need the best for each other.

I would really love for New River to look at this and to consider not just your pocket, because I think someone else could probably figure it out financially, but to truly consider here we all are humans in this room who want a future. So it's not

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    just -- it's not so cut and dry. Does New River want
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    to see success, sustainability?

DIRECT STATEMENT BY THE WITNESS:

Again, I'm a homeowner at 154 Pond Road here in Boone, North Carolina. I apologize, I will be reading from a prepared statement.

I understand that New River Light and Power has been criticized in recent months regarding options for renewable energy. With the recent pandemic, high labor and material costs, I would like convey that New River has and continued to have high quality service for my family and me.

In fact, a storm in 2009, we didn't have a generator, and we had to leave our house because of the downed power lines, right around the neighborhood like a bomb went off and trees coming down. We came back home a couple of days later after visiting my inlaws, and the ice cream in my freezer had barely even melted, and I thought that was amazing because we got our power right back. My brother works for Duke

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Power and he has been amazed at our power bills. He just wonders how it works. Our electric costs remain comparatively low while reliable -- reliability, I'm sorry, remains excellent, except for that squirrel that keeps -- the squirrel -- I think we got the squirrel. It keeps chewing our power line.
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I'm all for customers having a choice to install their own generation. I do not think I should have to pay for the installation of someone else's solar through unfair rates if solar generators were to get more for the energy they generate than the value they offset. As a math instructor, I believe that New River Light and Power's offer for renewable energy is chose -- is choice not to. If New River Light and Power is proposing to pass on any savings they see to the generating customer while continuing to prepare --I'm sorry -- to provide fair and reasonable rates to those that don't, then I feel confident that they are -- what they are doing -- I'm sorry -- what they're proposing is in the best interest of our community.
