

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PROCEEDINGS

COMMISSIONER McKISSICK: Good evening. I am Commissioner Floyd B. McKissick, Jr., of the North Carolina Utilities Commission, and with me tonight is Commissioner ToNola D. Brown-Bland.

I now call for hearing Docket E-22, Sub 658, In the Matter of Consideration of Certain Standards for Electric Utilities relating to Measures to Promote Greater Electrification of the Transportation Sector Pursuant to the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act.

The nature and purpose of this hearing is for the Commission to consider new federal ratemaking standards added to the Public Utilities Regulatory Policy Act of 1978, commonly known as PURPA, by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act enacted in 2021 with respect to Virginia Electric and Power Company doing business as Dominion Energy North Carolina, which I will refer to as Dominion.

The new PURPA standard requires each state to consider measures to promote greater electrification of the transportation sector, including the establishment of rates that:

(A) Promote affordable and equitable

Electric Vehicle charging options for residential, commercial, and public Electric Vehicle charging infrastructure.

- (B) Improve the customer experience associated with Electric Vehicle charging, including by reducing charging times for light, medium, and heavy-duty vehicles.
- (C) To accelerate third-party investments in Electric Vehicle charging for light, medium, and heavy-duty vehicles and,
- (D) Appropriately recover the marginal costs delivering electricity to electric vehicles and Electric Vehicle charging infrastructure.

On November 15th, 2023, the Commission issued its Order scheduling hearings, which, among other things, scheduled this Public Witness Hearing solely for the purpose of taking public testimony regarding measures the Commission could take to promote greater electrification of the transportation sector as set out in federal law. As directed by the Commission, Dominion published the notice of the date, time, and place of this hearing in newspapers of general circulation in the area for two consecutive weeks, which was completed by January 27th, 2023.

The Public Staff, which represents the Using and Consuming Public, has been made a party of this pursuant to North Carolina General Statute § 62-15. In addition, the following parties have petitioned to and been allowed to intervene in this proceeding, those being: ChargePoint, Incorporated and Carolina Industrial Group for Fair Utility Rates, commonly known as CIGFUR I.

On April 12, 2023 at the joint request of the Public Staff and Dominion, the Commission entered an Order Granting Motion to Amend Order Scheduling Hearings and canceling a previously scheduled expert witness hearing. Pursuant to that Order, the parties in this proceeding will file verified comments with the Commission in lieu of live testimony.

This bring us to the Public Witness Hearing tonight. Pursuant to the State Ethics Act, I remind all Members of the Commission of their duty to avoid conflicts of interest and inquire if any Commissioner has any known conflict of interest with respect to the matter coming before the Commission.

(No response)

COMMISSIONER McKISSICK: There appears to be no conflicts, so we will proceed. I will now call

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upon the parties to announce their appearances, beginning with Dominion.

MS. GRIGG: Good evening, Commissioner

McKissick, Commissioner Brown-Bland, Mary Lynne Grigg

with the Law Firm of McGuireWoods, appearing on behalf

of Dominion Energy North Carolina.

COMMISSIONER McKISSICK: I now recognize Public Staff.

MS. KEYWORTH: Good evening, Commissioners.

My name Anne Keyworth. I'm with the Public Staff and

I'm appearing on behalf of the Using and Consuming

Public.

COMMISSIONER McKISSICK: All right. Thank you both for being here. We'll now go into some of the details relating the way this hearing will be conducted. We appreciate you coming here to voice your views on important matters. We welcome your testimony and want to hear from you.

In conducting this hearing, the Commission functions in a judicial capacity. As we are required by North Carolina Law, we largely follow the North Carolina Rules of Civil Procedure and Rules of Evidence because the Commission functions as a court. We cannot respond to your questions. Rather, we are

here to receive testimony from you-all in the form of your spoken ideas relating to the matter before us this evening.

In this proceeding, the Public Staff represents you, the Using and Consuming Public, and will assist you in providing your testimony tonight.

In order to facilitate a full and fair opportunity for all speakers to participate we will use the following procedures:

- 1) Witnesses who wish to testify must sign up with the Public Staff. The Public Staff will call each witness in the order listed on the roster.
- 2) In order for each person to have an equal opportunity, there will be a limit of three minutes for each witness to speak. Therefore, witnesses should endeavor to avoid cumulative, repetitive, and redundant testimony. I doubt if we will have that problem or challenge this evening.
- and Evidence, I must have each witness sworn in or affirmed so that you can testify to the truth of your testimony prior to you providing that testimony. When you hear your name called, please proceed to the witness stand and I will deliver the oath. At that

point, you will be asked to please first state your name and address for purposes of the evidentiary record, and then you will begin your testimony.

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- 4) Please refrain from offering opinions on matters not related to the proceedings to implement amendments to PURPA, which is the issue before us in this docket this evening. Please direct your testimony to the Commission, not members of the audience. In lieu of all testimony, you may submit written testimony as long as you swear to its accuracy. Written statements must be submitted by a person under oath during this hearing.
- 5) Counsel for any party may ask questions of the witnesses tonight. In addition, the Commission will have the opportunity to ask questions. This means that if you provide testimony, you may be asked questions by the attorneys or by the Commissioners.
- 6) Testimony is being recorded by a court reporter. Therefore, to ensure accuracy of the record, we ask that you not engage in unconventional modes of testimony, such as singing. Additionally, please remain quiet when you are not testifying so the court reporter is able to hear the testifying witnesses. Please do not disturb the hearing by

clapping, booing, hissing, snapping your fingers or other such behaviors. We will instruct security to remove any member of the audience who is attempting to participate out of order or in any verbal or visual manner or is otherwise disturbing the hearing or the court reporter.

As a final reminder, the Commission and the attorneys for the parties are not allowed to respond to your questions during this hearing. However, both the Public Staff and Dominion have representatives who will be able and available after the hearing to answer your questions. Okay. Let us begin. Public Staff, will you call the first witness.

MS. KEYWORTH: Thank you, Commissioner

McKissick. The Public Staff has checked and confirmed
that there are no witnesses here who wish to testify
tonight.

COMMISSIONER McKISSICK: I will look to the audience. I'm not seeing any that are visible at this time, but I will say if there is anyone who is in this courtroom this evening that would like to testify at this time, please come forward, identify yourself by name, by residence, and state if you are a customer of Dominion.

(No response)

COMMISSIONER McKISSICK: I see none, I hear none, telepathically, I'm not connected to any, so I will assume that there are no witnesses which are appearing this evening before us. With that said, are there any other matters which need to come before us? I'll recognize Dominion and the Public Staff.

MS. GRIGG: No, sir.

MS. KEYWORTH: No, thank you.

We hereby stand adjourned. Thank you-all for being here. Let me thank you, Madam clerk, Tonja. We appreciate it. Thank you, deputies, for being here this evening. We appreciate your courtesy and security that you have provided us. Have a good evening and safe drive home.
