## Dear Ms. Casselberry,

I have recently received a letter regarding the application for increased water rates (docket # W-354, Sub 344) by the Carolina Water Service of North Carolina (CWSNC). The proposed rates are over 23% above the current rate – both the water rate and the "residential base charge". This is an outrageous increase!

When we moved to this location in Whispering Pines, NC two years ago, the water rate was \$5.00 per 1000 gallons and the "base charge" was \$16.81. I questioned the latter as I had never had anything like this in my previous 16 years in North Carolina. They said that was normal and every service company had that kind of a charge. I don't believe that is the true. In May, 2014 these rates were increased by 12.4% and 14.2% respectively. They were later reduced in August, 2104 by 3.2% and 4.9% respectively, Leaving, still, an annual net increase of 8.8% and 8.6% respectively – significantly above any cost-of-living increase.

In investigating the charges to customers of the other water utilities providing water service to nearby communities (Moore County and Southern Pines), I find that neither charge their customers a "base charge". The water usage rates are relatively comparable to the CWSNC rates – one below and one above. However, the proposed rate will be higher than both of the other agencies. The "base rate" will be increased by 23%.

A total increase of about 32% over a 2-year period is way out of line. CWSNC should actually be retaining the current rate or reducing it, while eliminating the "base charge". I might add that they have initiated a small new "water system improvement charge" to their customers in the last few months. I believe they should do a operational analysis to see where they can become more efficient and why other nearby water service agencies can provide their services at considerably less cost to their customers.

I respectfully request your investigation and resolution in this matter, so that these large increases in water rates over the past 2 years can be offset to a reasonable level and lower costs to the CWSNC customers can be realized. Thank you.
