

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PROCEEDINGS

COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Good afternoon.

Let's come to order and go on the record. I am Karen Kemerait of the North Carolina Utilities Commission, and with me this afternoon are Chair Mitchell, Commissioners Brown-Bland, Clodfelter, Duffley, McKissick and Hughes.

I now call for hearing Docket No. E-7, Sub 1282, In the Matter of Application of Duke Energy Carolinas, LLC, Pursuant to North Carolina General Statute Section § 62-133.2 and Commission Rule R8-55 Relating to Fuel and Fuel-related Charge Adjustments estimates for Electric Utilities.

North Carolina General Statute § 62-133.2 provides for annual fuel charge adjustment proceedings for electric utilities engaged in the generation or production of electricity by fossil or nuclear fuels. Commission Rule R8-55 provides that the fuel charge adjustment proceeding for Duke Energy Carolinas, LLC, that I'll refer to going forward as DEC, will be held the first Tuesday of June of each year and that DEC shall file its direct testimony and exhibits and shall publish notice prior to the hearing.

On February 28th, 2023, DEC filed its

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Application to adjust the fuel and fuel-related cost component of its electric rates along with the direct testimony and exhibits of Witnesses Sigourney Clark, Jeffrey Flanagan, John Swez, David Johnson, Kevin Houston, and Steven D. Capps.
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On March 1, 2023, DEC filed a corrected application to replace the previously filed version.

On March 16, 2023, the Commission issued an Order Scheduling Hearing, Requiring Filing of Testimony, Establishing Discovery Guidelines, and Requiring Public Notice. The Order scheduled DEC's Fuel Charge Adjustment hearing for today, Tuesday, May 30, 2023, beginning at 2:00 p.m.

The following parties have petitioned to and have been allowed to intervene in this proceeding:

Carolina Utility Customers Association, Inc., that

I'll call CUCA going forward, Southern Alliance for

Clean Energy, that I'll refer to as SACE going

forward, Carolina Industrial Group for Fair Utility

Rates, that I'll refer to as CIGFUR III going forward.

On May 4th, 2023, DEC filed the supplemental testimony and exhibits of Sigourney Clark.

On May 5, 2023, DEC filed the supplemental testimony of John Swez.

On May 9th, 2023, the Public Staff filed the joint testimony of Witnesses Darrell Brown, Public Utility Regulatory Analyst, Accounting Division, and Fenge Zhang, Public Utility Regulatory Manager, Accounting Division, and the confidential testimony and exhibits of Evan D. Lawrence, Engineer with the Energy Division.

Also, on May 9th, 2023, CIGFUR III filed the direct testimony and exhibits of Brian C. Collins.

On May 8th, of 2023, DEC filed the rebuttal testimony of Jeffrey Flanagan, some of which is confidential, and the testimony of John Swez as well as the joint rebuttal testimony of Witness Clark and Chris Bauer.

On May 9th, 2023, DEC filed the corrected exhibit and work papers for the rebuttal testimony of Witness Clark.

In that Order, the Commission excused CIGFUR Witness Collins and DEC Witnesses Johnson, Houston, and Capps from attending the expert witness hearing, and also to receive the testimony and exhibits of these witnesses into evidence, and to be made part of the record in this proceeding.

On May 26, of 2023, DEC filed the revised rebuttal testimony of John Swez, some of which is confidential, and the revised rebuttal testimony of Jeffrey Flanagan, some of which is confidential.

4	COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Can you begin by
5	stating your name and address for the record.
6	THE WITNESS: Yes. I am Beth McKee-Huger,
7	and I live at 6017 Bush Road in Brown Summit, North
8	Carolina 27214.
9	COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: You may proceed.
10	DIRECT-EXAMINATION BY MR. FREEMAN:
11	Q Thank you, Reverend. If you could please tell
12	the Commission and everyone in this room the
13	reason for your visit and your thoughts.
14	A Yes. I have been, all my life, an advocate for
15	people with lower incomes, and the additional
16	fuel cost is going to be a substantial burden on
17	people trying to pay their utility bills. I am
18	also a solar producer. My family has a small
19	solar installation and a contract with Duke
20	Energy to sell that power.
21	I'm really concerned about paying
22	extra for the fuel cost for fossil fuel where you
23	have to pay, pay them for the fuel and for the
24	transportation when you can get free fuel from

the sky for solar and for wind. Obviously, because we've got our own experience with it, you pay the capital for the solar installation, you pay for the maintenance, we pay for the interconnection cost with Duke Energy every month, but the fuel itself is free. And not only is the fuel free but it is clean, and the heat, heat-trapping gases from burning fossil fuel are contributing to climate change. And the methane from natural gas, both in fracking that's out of the ground and transporting it, and things like that, are very powerful heat-trapping gas that are significantly increasing the temperature of the earth. We see the damage from the severe storms in our country, whether it's -- the weather severity around the world is even greater, especially in the tropics where drought and floods from the -- from climate change. know that's a little bit far from the fuel cost, but the point is as the cost of all of that damage to the world is not even factored down, I'm sure, as you're figuring out the fuel cost, but there's no point of paying for fuel when you can get it free.

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1	Now, I realize, especially from
2	this previous hearing, that it's complicated
3	contracting for solar production. We learned
4	that from our own experience 10 years ago, but I
5	urge you to not have such a big fuel cost
6	adjustment so that people don't have to pay quite
7	as much, and that Duke Energy vigorously pursue
8	the transition to renewables rather than having
9	so many delays. Thank you.
10	MR. FREEMAN: Thank you, Reverend.
11	COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Are there any
12	questions from the parties for this witness?
13	MR. KAYLOR: No questions from Duke.
14	MR. FREEMAN: No questions from the Public
15	Staff.

If I may speak to the fact that the Company and Public Staff have reached an alignment on a partial settlement, and if it be to your pleasure, I can give you some of the core terms of that settlement. We have made the other parties, counsel, aware and we'll work towards formalizing the settlement agreement, to submit it for review. But if it works for you, Commissioner Kemerait, I can give you some of the core terms.

COMMISSIONER KEMERAIT: Yes, please.

MS. TOON: And, of course, the Public Staff, please, could add context applied to the case, maybe. So the Company and Public Staff have come to an agreement on a 16-month mitigant, and so recovery would take place over 16 months. As a part of that, there would be a 4 percent interest, and that interest would be on the Delta between what we would recover through the statutory 12-month period versus what we will cover over the six-month period, so the 16-month mitigant. And then in terms of the prospective rate, we are going to use an updated forecast, the spring forecast. Originally, the Company used the January forecast and then updated it, and then withdrew it as

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a part of the partial settlement. And with Public

    Staff, we will update, use the most recent forecast

    and send the prospectus based off of that. And so
    those are the core components of the partial

I think given sort of the timeline, I don't know if it would necessarily address sort of our core issues with respect to not feeling prepared to really kind of cross-examine or otherwise sort of develop the record in light of, sort of, what issues our clients see as being live in the proceeding. And so, I think similarly, appreciative of what DEC has offered, but I don't know if it really addresses some of our core issues with respect to not really being prepared. Obviously, understanding of the fact that this is an evolving settlement agreement, and obviously appreciative of the fact that, you know, there might be some things that need to be papered out, but we'd also request that the Commission be wanting to, I guess, continue or hold a hearing in recess until parties have had the opportunity to actually see and
