After reviewing the net metering policy put forward by Duke Energy, I am urging the NC Utilities Commission to reject that policy.

As a long-time volunteer and former BOD member of Chatham Habitat for Humanity (CHFH), I can speak with direct knowledge of how this proposal will affect low and middle income homeowners. CHFH puts rooftop solar PV units on houses sold to low and middle income households in Chatham County. Under current net metering rules, those families which have solar units on their homes, are paying between \$30 to \$50 per month for electricity. The proposed changes would substantially increase the cost of electricity to these families and thus endanger their financial resiliency.

To be clear, these households are already at a distinct disadvantage to use solar systems due to their high upfront costs. Duke Energy's proposal would further widen this gap. It is no secret that low and middle income families are the most impacted by the effects of climate change. The ability of these households to have access to **renewable** solar energy is a huge benefit for the kinds of families that CHFH works with.

From what I understand, the current solar program that CHFH offers will, most likely, not be viable should this misguided new policy be put into place. This would be a great loss to our partner households and the community, at large.

Therefore, I urge the NC Utilities Commission to reject Duke Energy's proposed net metering policy.
