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## PROCEEDINGS

HEARING EXAMINER WINSTEAD: Good morning.

Let's come to order and go on the record. My name is

Ann Winstead, a Hearing Examiner for the North

Carolina Utilities Commission, and I've been assigned

to preside over this hearing tonight.

I now call for hearing Docket Number W-1343, Sub 1, in the Matter of an Application of GWWTP, LLC, or I may refer to them as GWWTPWTP or the Company, for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity to Provide Wastewater Utility Service to Ginguite Woods Subdivision in Dare County, North Carolina, and for approval of rates.

On January 11, 2024, GWWTP filed an Application for a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity for Approval of Rates seeking to provide wastewater utility service to Ginguite Woods in Dare County, North Carolina.

On February 2, 2024, in Docket Number W-1343, Sub 1, the Commission issued an Order Establishing New Docket for CPCN Application, Finding CPCN Application Complete, and Requiring the Public Staff to Provide Specific Applications Data.

On February 9, 2024, the Public Staff filed

a letter in response to Commission Order.

On February 14, 2024, the Commission issued an Order Scheduling Hearings, Establishing Discovery Guidelines, and Requiring Customer Notice. That Order scheduled a public hearing for 7:00 p.m. on Monday, March 18, 2024, in Manteo, North Carolina, which is where we are tonight, for the sole purpose of receiving testimony from GWWTP's customers in the Ginguite Woods service area.

On March 1, 2024, GWWTP filed its

Certificate of Service, verifying that all affected

customers have been served with the required notice as

ordered by the Commission.

On March 11, 2024, the direct testimony of Robert Howsare on behalf of GWWTP, LLC, was filed.

That brings us up-to-date.

I will now explain our process for how this hearing will be conducted so that everyone is aware of our procedures. When you are called to the witness stand, I will seek your name and affirmation that your testimony is the truth. Then, each witness will be asked identifying questions by counsel for the Public Staff so that it will be clear in the record who the speaker is. After that, you are free to start

providing your statement.

Due to the number of customers that would like to make a statement tonight, each customer will have approximately 3 minutes to testify. The countdown of the allotted 3 minutes will be reflected on the counter to your left. Please strive to complete your statement within this allotted time period. Because your statement is important to us, and we do want to hear from you this evening, if you go slightly beyond your 3 minutes to complete your statement, that will be allowed.

After your time is up and you have completed your testimony, counsel for the parties and I will be given the opportunity to ask you any questions pertaining to your testimony. These questions are intended to clarify your testimony for the record or to supplement the record for this proceeding. It's important that the Commission's record on this matter is clear because it will be part of the evidence used to base the Commission's decisions.

Each customer who wishes to speak will be given an opportunity to do so, but only one person may speak at a time. When your name is called, please come forward to the table designated for the witness.

We are holding this public hearing tonight because we want to hear from you, and your views are important and need to be heard. Our Court Reporter will take down every word of this proceeding and will later produce a verbatim transcript of your testimony and all that is said during this hearing. You will not be allowed to ask questions from the witness stand. The sole purpose of this hearing is to receive testimony from the customers of GWWTP.

However, if you have questions, Ms. Darden and Ms. Newell, who are part of the Public Staff and represents you-all in this proceeding as part of the Using and Consuming Public, and Mr. Finley, who represents GWWTP will tell you how to be in touch with them following this proceeding, so they can assist you in having your questions or any service issues addressed.

I would like to point out that, by statute, the Public Staff is the advocate for the consumers, both residential and nonresidential. The Public Staff is an independent organization that has their own experts like engineers, accountants, and attorneys to help them in their representation of the public. The Public Staff represents each of you that customers of

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GWWTP in this proceeding.
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2 Lastly, as I previously mentioned, I'm the 3 Commission Hearing Examiner, and I have been asked to preside over this public hearing this evening. 4 5 serve as an advisor to the three Commissioners who 6 have been assigned to make decisions regarding GWWTP's 7 Application for CPCN. I will inform the three 8 Commissioners regarding your testimony provided this 9 evening. They will also read the transcript of 10 tonight's hearing prepared by the Court Reporter. Now, will the parties please announce their 11 12 appearances for the record, beginning with the 13 Company. 14 MR. FINLEY: May it please the Commission, 15 my name is Ed Finley, Raleigh, North Carolina, 16 appearing on behalf of the Applicant, GWWTP.

17 HEARING EXAMINER WINSTEAD: Thank you, Mr.

18 Finley.

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MS. NEWELL: Good afternoon, everyone.

Davia Newell, representing the Public Staff the Using and Consuming Public.

HEARING EXAMINER WINSTEAD: Thank you,

Ms. Newell. Ms. Newell, do you have any witness.

MS. NEWELL: I do, and we'd like to call the

1 first witness, Wayne Avery. 2 3 HEARING EXAMINER WINSTEAD: Hello, 4 Mr. Avery. 5 WAYNE AVERY; having been duly sworn, 7 testified as follows: 8 HEARING EXAMINER WINSTEAD: You may begin. 9 DIRECT STATEMENT BY THE WITNESS: 10 I want to introduce myself. I'm Wayne 11 I live at 43 Fox Wood Circle, Southern Shores 12 I am currently the President for the HOA. 13 I've lived there for 11 years. I'd like to give your just a quick break down of our community. There's 38 14 15 homes in our community. Out of the 38 homes, 14 only 16 had one person living in it, 16 had two people living 17 in it, 6 houses has two or more people -- like some 18 children or some other kids there -- 2 of the houses 19 are not full-time residents. They come here a couple 20 times a year. 21 The possibly 67 percent of the residents in 22 our neighborhood are senior citizens aged 65 and 23 older, and they all are on a fixed income. The -- we 24 have paid over the years \$90 a month, which is \$41,000

a year, which I don't know what has happened to that money while the plant hasn't been taken care of. as Saga has it, which they rebuilt, which they needed, but they purchased it so they can develop the land next to it. And I realize they put the money into it, but now they want us -- they want to double our rates to 180. If you're looking at over \$80,000 a year, they want us to pay to pay back all the -- what they have -- the money they've invested into the sewer plant, which they are going to use to develop the land next to us. I just -- the rate is just unsustainable to us. It's just very difficult for us on a fixed income to have to pay this type of sewage rate. And I ask you, how many in this room would like to pay \$175, 80 (sic) a month for sewer? And the problem with this is, it's not going to stop at this, they're going to want to increase it again. And, you know, my question is, when is it going to stop? At what point? I just ask the Commission to please do not grant this type of rate for us that we just -- it's just difficult for us in the neighborhood to pay it. It's just way too high. Usually, any type of development that people

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build, is included for the buyers like, the roads, the

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    sewage, and water. We've already paid for that.
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    And now, Saga wants us to pay more for their
 3
    development. And I can't imagine them going to sell a
 4
    house where they want to develop and tell somebody,
 5
    "Oh, by the way, you're going to pay $200 a month for
    sewer." That's not going to fly, but they want us to
 7
    pay these rates. And it's just too difficult. Like I
 8
    said, you can look at the audience, at the people out
9
    there, these are our residents that have come here
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    today, and there's a few of them in there that's over
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    65 and on a fixed income, and to try to pay these
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    rates, it's just going to be very difficult for us.
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    And I just ask the board to, you know, please do not
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    grant them this type of rate.
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              We have had no input whatsoever, the
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    residents, in regards to the sewer plant as far as the
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    development, and even before that, we never knew
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residents, in regards to the sewer plant as far as the development, and even before that, we never knew anything about it. So -- I don't know if my time is up -- but anyway, I just ask to not charge that type of rate to give us a lower rate on that. And if we could have some type of discussion with someone about the rates instead of just sending us a letter saying, "Well, this is what they requested you pay." It's just too much for us.

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1 So does anyone have any questions for me? DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MS. NEWELL: 2 3 I do, Mr. Avery. Just, are you affiliated with 4 any --5 If you're going to talk to me, you're going to 6 have to come up here. I can't hear you. 7 Are you affiliated with any parties to this 8 proceeding? 9 Ma'am, I can't hear you. I have bad hearing. Α 10 you come up here and talk to me. 11 I'll come on up. Are you affiliated with any of 12 the parties in this proceeding? 13 Any what? Α 14 In this proceeding, the Company or --15 I'm just a resident. I'm a full-time 16 resident of Southern Shores Landing, Dare County. 17 I live here full-time. 18 Have you had any service-related issues? 19 Not since I've been there. I've been there 11 20 years. I've never had a problem. None 21 whatsoever. 22 MS. NEWELL: Thank you. 23 MR. FINLEY: No questions. Thank you for 24 coming, Mr. Avery.

| 16 | DIRECT STATEMENT BY THE WITNESS:                      |
| 17 | As Mr. Avery stated, most of the people in            |
| 18 | our community do live on a fixed income and are       |
| 19 | retired. What I would like to ask the Commission to   |
| 20 | really take a look at is most of the residents,       |
| 21 | including myself, I live directly across the street   |
| 22 | from the wastewater treatment plant, and since I've   |
| 23 | been there since 2018, the Applicant has owned the    |
| 24 | plant. And they bought the plant, knowing the         |

condition that the plant was in. Knowing that it needed to be -- that it wasn't functioning properly. For us residents, we have had to go through, in the last five or six years, continual smell coming from the plant. Effluent coming up out of the manhole covers running down our street. Having the effluent discharged in our neighborhood. And the retention pond that wasn't being kept up, or being used in the function of what it was attended. And the whole time, the Applicant has had the opportunity to make repairs and bring our sewage treatment plant up to the standard of what it should have been, but they refused to do that because it didn't benefit them. And now they want to develop their property, again, like Mr. Avery said, they're looking for our community to foot the bill for that so they can, in turn, make millions of dollars on development.

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Having an increase that doubles our rate, I find it very unfair to the residents that have, for the last 20 years, paid into the maintenance and upkeep of the sewer plant and nothing has been done to it. You don't see any type of insurance commission or electrical commission all of a sudden doubling their consumers rates. You know, things like that should

| be at least if the rates are going to go up, they     |
|---|
| should phased in over time. Not when you wake up one  |
| day paying 90 and the next day you're paying 180. And |
| they've also indicated in the letter that the         |
| Commission sent out that they already want another    |
| rate increase for next year.                          |
|   |

As the Public Staff, I would hope that you would fight and advocate for the residents and citizens of our community to fight against this outrageous rate increase that we're looking at.

Thank you.

MS. NEWELL: Nothing from the Public Staff.

EXAMINATION BY MR. FINLEY:

- Q Mr. Huband, can you help me identify where the manholes are where you say that the effluent has come out of --
- Yes. They are located on Landing Trail. I can't remember the house number it's in front of, but it's on Landing Trail and we have seven homes starting at the bypass and go around the curve, and this is the last house on Landing Trail on the curve. There's a manhole cover there.

Anytime we had excessive rain, the effluent would just run right out of the manhole cover and

- 1 right down the street multiple times up until the 2 Applicant decided to finally replace one of the 3 main tanks in the front.
- 4 And when did that -- replace the main tank Q 5 happen?
- 6 Last year.
- 7 Okay.
- And I will add -- can I continue to speak?
- 9 0 Sure.

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I will add that the Applicant, when they were making repairs to the sewage treatment plant, they had an opportunity to bring the sewage treatment plant up to its full operating standard; however, they chose to take the easy route and the cheapest route and just replace one of the tanks because they thought they could get away with that and that the Town Southern Shores would give them a building permit for them to build on their property.

They can't build on that property unless they have a functioning sewer plant to hook up to. Now, they own that property, and they own the plant, so we are at the mercy of them.

24 Again, they didn't decide to do anything in the last five years because they weren't going to develop that property, so there was no -- there was no benefit to them. And the operators of that plant, who are actually taking care of that plant, would inform us that they have just been told to just keep the toilets flushing because that's all they want to do.

They did not want to put any money into it because it wasn't going to be any financial benefit to them. And now that they are going to develop that property, all of a sudden now they want to do it and they took the easy route, only replacing one of the tanks, knowing full well that they were still pumping the fluid into the retention pond when it was supposed to be going through the and out through the landscaping through the irrigation system, which is nonfunctioning and has not functioned.

So there has to be some kind of accountability held for the Applicant. Not only that, but the State Utilities Commission has been fining them repeatedly over the last five years. Thousands of dollars and numerous, numerous fines. So there has to be some type of

accountability instead of putting the burden on us residents to help facilitate all those repairs.

- Q I know it's hard to do, but can you describe -describe what what you say the smell is? I mean, there's -- any sewer treatment is going to have some smell. Can you just sort of describe it for me, please?
- A Well, it's raw sewage. It's what it smells like. It's smells like effluent. You know, your poop and pee that comes out when you walk down the street that's when the wind blows at certain times that's what we smell for the last 4 years until they replaced the tank pretty much on a daily basis.

Not only that, but multiple well testings have been failing. And, again, for what we've paid into it over the last 20 years at 90 bucks a month for 20 years had to have added up to hundreds of thousands of dollars. So where did this money go? Who got that money? Where did it go, and why wasn't it used to maintain this?

Again, we are being asked to foot the bill for a portion of this repair and upgrade so these

| 22 | to make 30. So although I'm under the age that Wayne  |  |
| 23 | said, I am retired. I am on a fixed income, and I     |  |
| 24 | want to address some things that Wayne and Matt have  |  |

not and it's on consumption.

So in the declaration of protected covenants and restrictions that were dated 12/2/2002, when our development was created, they put in there -- in the deed, also, dated the same day -- that it was going to have 50 single family units at 18,000 gallons per day and no tap fee. So they cannot give us another tap fee. Each time somebody was going to purchase this, they had to carry on that same agreement.

So now we are at 38 single family units.

And by their own testimony, Mr. Gupta, and also

Michael Strader, which is from Quible, we use 6,000

gallons per day.

The tank is 32,500 gallons per day, which means they are requesting for us to pay 100 percent, because if you look at the Application -- and let me tell you some issues with the Application so number one: If you look at Exhibit 8, Atlantic OBX Reality -- I mean, Atlantic OBX sewer people, the contract's not signed by them.

How is it a contract if two people don't sign it? How is it an agreement if two people don't sign it? They put in there that we pay them \$4,000 a month for their services. The contract wasn't signed.

How is it a valid contract? We do not know how much Saga pays them, because it's not a valid contract.

Also, if you look at the -- number two on the Application, the service area, Ginguite mixed-used area has the same amount of sewage treatment as our community. Now, we are mandated by our homeowner's association to only have six people in each home because of the restraint on the sewer system. That's where they came up with the one \$18,000[sic] -- 18,000 gallons, but now they're asking for us to pay 100 percent. I'm running out of time.

So there is a lot of fallacies. There's -I have minutes where they have made -- they have
spoken to the Town of Southern Shores. These aren't
drafts. These are actual minutes quoting that
Mr. Supta has spent nine \$900,000 on sewer. \$900,000.
But then you look at the Application, it's like,
\$100,000 here, \$400,000 there, \$500,000 there. It's
just -- we are a small community made up of retired
folks that love each other. We look out for each
other. We have widowers having coffee every morning
checking up on each other. I, myself, put the
trashcans back and forth for my elderly neighbor, who
until a year ago, was -- she's in her 80's. I don't

want to say how old she is. She'll get really mad -but she was a volunteer for a hotline; a shelter for
abused woman. She was on call on Tuesday nights to
answer the phone to help these women.

My son and others are volunteers. My son owns his own home is our community. They're volunteers at the Southern Shores Fire Department. We have one house that is a seasonal rental, and they put on a they -- they did it last year. They didn't have any rentals. And as of today, they don't have any rentals.

So we are a community of friends and family that look out for each together that are predominantly on a fixed income. We have teachers. We have health care workers. And these people -- we are not -- I'm not getting a raise with my retirement to pay for Saga's mistake. And I will have to agree with Matt on the smell.

And if you also look -- and I'm very surprised the Utilities Commission hasn't handled this, but there's no signage. Keep out. There's no contact this person, their contractor if something happens. No stay away. Nothing. No Utilities

Commission thing. Nothing on their fence. And I

1 walked all around that at the end of the day.

2 Now, we were supposed to get -- according to 3 the deed, we're supposed to get sprinklers. Okay. 4 Sprinklers were supposed to be coming from the 5 irrigation system, filtered, and then every part of 6 the common area in Southern Shores Landing was 7 quaranteed sprinklers. They were there from the 8 beginning, and then they fell apart. But, if you 9 notice on Saga's plan, the irrigation system for their 10 new buildings is there. Miraculously, it showed up, 11 but they're not even giving us the service from the 12 very beginning on our deed.

And I'll shut up now, because I went way
over.

15 DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MS. NEWELL:

- Q Ms. Sears, just one quick follow-up. Did you file a consumer statement and position on March 8, 2024?
- 19 A I did.

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- 20 Q And is this the statement that you filed?
- 21 A Yes.

DIRECT STATEMENT BY THE WITNESS:

My neighbors have done a pretty good job of summing things up very briefly but, nevertheless, summing up the major points. The 10 years I've been in Southern Shores Landing, I've never once gotten a notice of noncompliance about utilities. It seems to have been a shell game between the license, the ownership, who owns what when, who's taking responsibility. It's very difficult for consumers to understand things like that, and over the years it — it baffles me trying to understand if you have a Utilities Commission that is overlooking something like this, how is it going on this long and it's still out of compliance? How do you put \$400,000 into something and it's still out of compliance? Where's our money gone over the last, for me, 10 years.

That's over \$400,000 right there. And it's worse now -- well, two years ago -- a year and a half ago, this is worse than it's ever been. That money just vanished.

That's very upsetting. Especially to those of us -- I'm not 65 yet, but I'm close. I'm almost there. Soon we'll be on a fixed income.

Time and time again, we've never been told the full truth. We have to dig it out, and it's only until we dig out the truth and throw it out there that anybody pays attention to this. If we aren't the strong community, the little 38 homes that we are standing up for ourselves, Saga would've gotten their plants. Saga would've been trying build their million dollar commercial and apartments and everything else they want to put on that little sunken piece of land using a utility that doesn't even work now for 38 homes.

And the stench is awful in the summer. I don't want to walk my dog there anymore because it stinks. If something stinks that bad, for somebody like me who knows nothing about sewage systems, that's a bad sign.

And it also baffles me why -- if something

is out of compliance, why does it continue to remain out of compliance and the entity that is supposed to be overlooking it does not pay attention. I don't understand that either. And I don't understand why the shell game was being played for so long. Nobody knew anything. We've never been given a notice that anything was wrong. We had to smell it to find out. Fortunately, we can still flush.

I would hope and pray that you have our backs when you make this decision because we're a little community. I heard in the Town meetings that we use 70 percent of the whole thing, and yet, it's out of compliance for 10 years and now you want us to pay for fixing it all. I don't know -- that just doesn't add up to me. That's a whole lot of money for somebody else to get rich. Because nobody in our neighborhood is that rich. I can guarantee you that.

And, you know, I just don't understand why we're paying so much more than typical in the state for a system that has been fined regularly. And it's great that the Commission can see enough that it's not in compliance that they're issuing fines to Saga all this time, but, again, where's -- where's the next step of repairing when the fines are issued?

That's all I wanted to say.
